## Des Moines youth rodeo picks up speed

On a day when the wind was sometimes faster than the horses, the second youth rodeo of the season was held at the Des Moines rodeo arena Saturday. The series, now midway through its ninth year, is run by the nonprofit Sierra Grande Horse Association, which was originally formed by six sets of parents. "We had so many ranching kids with such a love of horses," says founding member Gayle Rivale, "but they had no place to show off their horses or their horsemanship."

SGLA and its rodeos are entirely run by volunteers. Saturday Shari Morrow and

Randy Monroe were in the ring as Judge and Ring Steward, respectively. Leanne Monroe escaped the wind as the announcer up in the crow's nest, assisted by Shannon Hittson, the SGLA secretary/treasurer, who kept track of all the entries and results. President Raymond Rivale walked a couple miles just keeping everything running smoothly, assisted by his wife Gayle.

Many parents pitched in to work gates, move barrels or poles, and line up kids and their horses. Gayle Rivale heaped praise on the events' many sponsors - from Raton, Clayton, Boise City, Texline, Dalhart, Des

sponsorship not only covers expenses, she said, but also allows winners to take away nice prizes. In fact, individual point leaders at the end-of-year ceremonies win belt buckles and cash prizes.

Three to four dozen kids enter in four divisions: Preboosters are aged 3-8; Boosters are 9-11; Juniors 12-14; and Seniors are 15 years and up, including some 18-year-olds.
