Festivities begin with the Summer Art Street Fair on Des Moines's Main Street (Broadway Avenue, Highway 64/87) from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday. Featuring local foods, arts, crafts, and farmers market, the event focuses on the arts, including sidewalk chalk art and a public mural painting on Studio

Saturday evening from 5 to 6:30 p.m., the Folsom Museum presents a public spaghetti dinner in the old Folsom Schoolhouse. A \$5 donation is requested. Expect to see a lot of thin

people: this event doubles as the traditional carbo-loading dinner for runners the night before the Capulin Volcano Run.

Then it's back to the Mandala Center, just west of Des Moines, for an evening sunset concert open to all. Last year's performance was so well-received that soprano Valerie Powell, pianist Eileen Terry, and flautist Randi Whitman will return for an evening of songs, arias, and classical music. The concert will be followed by a wine-and-cheese social. The event runs from 7 to 9 p.m., with donations accepted. The Mandala Center requests RSVP at 575-278-3002, preferably by Wednesday, so they can be prepared for all that arrive.

Sunday's events begin early with the second annual Capulin Volcano Run. Half-marathon runners will gather at the Folsom Schoolhouse at 6:00 a.m. for a shuttle up to the starting line near Capulin Volcano National Monument. As the starting gun cracks to send them on their way to the volcano's rim and back down to Folsom, 5K runners and Fun-Run/Fun-Walk participants will all gather at the Folsom Schoolhouse at 7:00 a.m. After all the runners and walkers converge at the schoolhouse, there will be a postrace party with giveaways.
