
Art appreciation students study Solano Photography Show at Old Pass Gallery

Raton Main Street hosts Syd Masters concert

Though the thermometer sat above 90 degrees Sunday afternoon, a cooling breeze swept down from the Raton Pass and right under the generous shade trees of Ripley Park as 200 people spread out on blankets and lawn chairs to enjoy Raton Main Street's latest gift to the city. The free concert by renowned cowboy swing band Syd Masters & The Swing Riders combined well-received original songs with many clas-

sic cowboy songs that appeared

to be enjoyed by people - and

dogs - of all ages. Masters formed his band 12 years ago and has now toured nearly half the states and 131 New Mexico towns. Based in Edgewood, NM, the band's constant touring and playing have honed its skills. The rhythms and harmonies were top-notch, with particularly fluid and swinging guitar work from "Uncle Bob", Bob Goldstein, who also played mandolin and harmonica and joined upright bassist Lance Quadri in providing Masters with tight vocal harmonies.

Masters had some imposing challenges to overcome. Raton Main Street had set up large

speaker columns that rose high and blocked the band's view of large portions of Ripley Park and the audience, who in turn had much of the bandstand blocked from its view. Then, the large concrete area immediately in front of the bandstand was in direct sun, and hot, so the audience sat in the lush cool comfort of the lawn under the big shade trees, creating a distance Masters worked hard to overcome.

He succeeded, with betweensong banter and tales, repartee with his band mates, songs that got the crowd swaying...and yodeling. His grandstand yodeling on his own "Galisteo Highway" was a great crowdpleaser and a highlight of the concert. Beloved cowboy favorites such as "The Streets of Laredo", "Leaving Cheyenne", and "Cool Water" were interspersed with Masters' own songs, including "Under New Mexico Skies", which was recently selected by the legislature and governor as "The Official Cowboy Song of the State of New Mexico. Masters also used frequent humor to help him win over the Ripley Park crowd. One of his songs had the lines, "Frying bacon in the nude/That is what I like to

do/Because it reminds me of

you." Masters followed the song with the quip, "I was actually wearing chaps and a cowboy hat when I fried that bacon.' Another lyric said, "The more people I meet, the more I like my dog." Before breaking into a three-part a cappella section of "You Are My Sunshine", Masters told the audience that a cappella is Italian for "I forgot the chords."

Progressive cities such as Santa Fe and Albuquerque have long seen the wisdom in providing their citizens with free outdoor concerts for all ages. Raton Main Street should be commended for its summer concert series at Ripley Park, which on Sunday attracted people from Des Moines, Cimarron, and other surrounding towns and had to make Raton look pretty attractive to visiting tourists.

Raton Main Street's published statement of purpose says, "We are committed members of the community dedicated to improving the quality of life in Raton by revitalizing our downtown area. We want to foster business prosperity and offer new economic opportunities. We seek to have a community where all generations can have a sense of pride in Raton and all cultures feel respect for their heritage." Sunday's well-
