
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

Suspect in stabbing death still at large BY C-N STAFF

Local authorities are still looking for the suspect in the stabbing death last Sunday of 24-year-old Kyle William Phillips of Weston.

Phillips was stabbed to death, allegedly by Trinity Jay Romero, 32, of Trinidad, at the Empty Pocket Saloon at 1810 N. Linden. Because the incident took place just outside of city limits, the Las Animas County Sheriff's Office is handling the case.

Romero reportedly talked to police on Monday and said he would turn himself in, but had not so as of Thursday evening.

There was a warrant put out Monday for the arrest of Romero on second-degree murder, a Class Continued on page 4



Health Careers Pathways launches in Raton

RATON - Raton graduates have a hard time finding good jobs at home, jobs that would allow them to remain in their hometown. Miners Colfax Medical Center (MCMC) has a hard time filling its many professional job openings, such a hard time that it has actively recruited employees from as far away as the Philippines.

Last March, MCMC CEO Michael Carter mentioned the problem during a chat with Raton Public Schools Superintendent David Willden. Willden responded, "Well, as superintendent of schools, it's my responsibility to create a qualified applicant pool for you.'

Just five months later, their new Health Career Pathway program is launching with the new school year. High school juniors and seniors from Raton, Des Moines, and Maxwell schools are eligible to enroll immediately. Springer and Cimarron schools have also been invited to participate.

Willden and Carter made some phone calls and organized a task force of many key players in Colfax County. Raton Schools and MCMC were quickly joined by the Colfax County Commission, Luna Community College, New Mexico Highlands University, Area Health Education Committee (AHEC) of Las Vegas, Northeast New Mexico

Medical Foundation (NENMMF), Des Moines Schools, and Maxwell Schools.

RHS Principal Michael Sparaco, counselor Kris Forrester, and special education supervisor Lou Martinez spent countless summer hours helping to create a program; they were quickly joined by Raton Schools head nurse Santina (Tina) Frank, who will teach courses in the new program.

Training and coursework will take place daily during the last two hours of the school day. Students completing all components of the program during their junior and senior years can graduate from high school with 22 college credits already under their belts; that's nearly a full year's worth of college credits. Some courses earn dual credit for high school and college simultaneously.

Frank will teach courses at the RHS campus, but classes will often be available via Instructional Television (ITV) for students in outlying schools. Luna Community College and New Mexico Highlands University will deliver some courses. After initial coursework, students will spend much of their time at MCMC, rotating through various departments to gain experience.

Organizers hope to have about 15 students this year, then 30 in the future – 15 juniors and 15 seniors. The first 10 students have already signed up and **Continued on page 4**
