

# Huge NM auction draws crowd from six states

Nara Visa, NM – The auction goods were spread over so many acres Saturday that a security guard had to keep patrol on

a four-wheeler. Veteran auctioneer "Colonel" Swede L. Swedeen assembled so much estate-sale merchandise that the handbills drew crowds from six states, including Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Kansas, and Iowa, in addition to New Mexico. By noon, the all-day sale had registered more than 50 bidders, many of whom sat patiently under shade trees waiting for their target goods to come on sale. There were more than a

dozen cars and trucks from the 1940s and 50s, along with others of later vintage. There was a 1954 Harley Davidson motorcycle, and a speedboat. There were several horse-drawn carriages, horses not included –

though when auctioning off a fire hydrant, Swedeen quipped, "We got a dog that goes with this."

Saddles, mannequins, quilts, antique gas pumps, a sawmill, a life-size wooden Indian – there seemed to be no limit to the merchandise. There was even an 1860 Civil War jail cell, complete with the original lock, key, and leg irons.

Posted to every available vertical surface were colorful metal signs of every size and vintage, more than 100 of them altogether. Some, such as gas station signs, were so big they'd take a large truck to remove.

Tables holding kitchen goods would span half a football field. There were more than a dozen old working clocks, alongside cutlery sets and serving dishes.

A 1929 mahogany drop-leaf dining table went for \$110, a large wicker basket filled with marbles for \$27.50. A handy gardening tool, "a Missouri Worm Shovel," brought \$10.

While Swedeen's wife, Marie, tabulated sales in the office, his daughter, Roxie Keen, stood by his side writing down all the sale data. Roxie's husband, Jim Keen, patrolled the grounds on the four-wheeler, perhaps over-qualified for the job: he's a Pueblo County (CO) deputy sheriff and highly-decorated 20-year veteran of the US Army Rangers and Green Berets. All he did Saturday

was smile, though he did identify himself as a full-time coyote hunter: "Seven days a week I hunt coyotes, both the four-legged and two-legged kinds." He also runs cattle and performs his own vivid cowboy poetry.

With a headset microphone attached as he moved through the grounds, bringing the crowd with him, Swedeen spoke in regular English, not the speaking-in-tongues patois of other auctioneers. With so much merchandise to move, he

kept to the business at hand, limiting the jokes and banter. At one point he started in, then interrupted himself, saying, "Well, I'll tell the story after the auction's over – Campfire tonight!"

Indeed, a huge fire pit was already prepared; it was easy to imagine tall flames lighting tired faces around the circle after a long day in the sun. On the other hand, it wouldn't be hard to imagine that Swedeen had auctioned off the fire pit, too.
