## BPA management group wins New Mexico title

Raton High School's Business Management Team recently won first place in the state of New Mexico during the Business Professionals of America annual State Leadership Conference in Albuquerque. Competing against more than 800 students from all sizes of high schools, from 1A to 5A, the team is now preparing to represent New Mexico at the national conference in Washington, D.C., May 4-8.

Seniors Phillip Mendez, Savannah Arguello, Raquel Herrera, and Thomas Hattaway will be joined in the national competition by junior Sabrina Jaramillo, who won a slot as an alternate team member after being named national voting delegate at the state con-

For the year's project, the team created an elaborate business plan for a general merchandise discount store called "TG World" which might compete with the likes of Wal-Mart. "We researched and selected inventories, pricing, target age groups, and locations," said Mendez. "We considered online aspects of marketing as well as physical

From the state competition at The Marriott in Albuquerque, the Raton team is honing its business plan to present at the BPA's National Leadership Conference at The Hilton in Washington, D.C. They'll fly from Denver, getting out of a whole week of school for the trip. However, they'll be in a hurry to get back: not only is it prom weekend, but Hattaway is the catcher on the RHS baseball team, which hopes to be competing in the first round of the state championship that weekend.

The monthly Trinidad & Animas County Chamber of Commerce luncheon in the Trinidad Junior College Pioneer Room offered three speakers and lots of valuable information for the price of one Wednesday.

Col. Ken Knapp spoke on behalf of the Colorado Procurement Technical Assistance Center, now getting firmly entrenched in Trinidad; Joe O'Brien spoke for luncheon sponsor Mobile Record Shredders that dispose of confidential business transaction documents; and Colorado Lottery Director Abel Tapia outlined what the lottery is doing to help support numerous Southern Colorado projects.

"We are here to help any business in Colorado that wants to do business with the government," said Knapp. "You can be a small, medium or large business who wants to do business with anybody in the government system - federal, state, city, county, local, Trinidad State Junior College, the housing developmental authority. That is all government, taxpayer money for any business who wants to do business with them but isn't quite sure where to do that is where we can help you out."

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

PTAC also helps the business find procurement opportunities, do the marketing and talk to a prospective government client. "We will proof your proposal before you submit it if that's what you want us to do," said Knapp. "We will work with you anywhere along the acquisition process where you would like our help. And we're a free service being grantfunded through the federal and state governments and through private donations."

Knapp said PTAC counselors are willing to travel to Trinidad to see two to three clients a day here, using current office space occupied by the chamber. Colorado PTAC first established its presence in Trinidad with 14 counseling sessions last March involving five active clients working with 31 different businesses here, Knapp said. By late last year, that number had grown to 132 counseling sessions.

"Of the (Trinidad area) clients we're working with, they have received \$5 million worth of government contracts, which equates to over 100 jobs for the local area down here," said Knapp. "That's a success story for Trinidad and Las Animas County."

Such documents can include any business credit transaction information with name, address phone number or other private data that if discovered by a third party could lead to identity theft, O'Brien said, noting such document disposal can be done on site. The company also benefits the environment.

'All the paper that we take in, we recycle," he said. "In this day and age, we're all concerned about excess materials. We take the paper, bale it and send it out to a recycling broker who puts it back into the system. Since 2004, we've saved over \$5 million what we call value savings in trees saved, kilowatt hours saved and water saved."

Residential "shoe-box" type paper disposal services are also now available from Mobile Record Shredders, O'Brien noted.

Former state representative and senator Tapia said, "I'm all about Southern Colorado and have spent all my life here." His primary goal is to expand lottery sales into more area retail outlets while educating the public where and how those \$2.2 billion in state lottery funds are distributed throughout the state.

While 62 percent of all lottery revenues are offered as prize money to the players, he said 23.5 percent of the proceeds are returned to state projects and parks through the Department of Local Affairs, Great Outdoors Colorado and Conservation Trust Fund. His slide presentation showed several Trinidad area projects, mostly environmental and river walk, that have been funded by the state lottery.

Tapia said this year's state lottery proceeds are on pace to be significantly ahead of the total \$112.9 million received in 2010.
