

Special to The Chronicle-News RATON — After flying annually from 1994 through 2010, the International Santa Fe Trail Balloon Rally returns to Raton this weekend after a break triggered by the 2011 Track Fire.

.Raton MainStreet has assumed leadership of the event, led by rally director Christine Valentini.

Saturday and Sunday activities include pancake breakfasts, a downtown parade, a balloonthemed art show, a live radio broadcast and DJ music. The daily highlight will be the mass ascension of 15 hot air balloons at sunrise each morning, filling the sky over Raton.

The event is popular with pilots, photographers, and spectators because of the beautiful Rocky Mountain backdrop and the close access to the balloons available at Raton's La Mesa Airfield southwest of town.

The Santa Fe Trail Balloon Rally began with an 18-year-old's wish. Californian Jarrod Giacomo had multiple sclerosis but dreamed of floating above the earth in a hot air balloon. The best his family could find for him in California was a tethered ride for \$400

Giacomo spent the summers with his grandmother in Raton where his uncle, Chuck Henry, arranged a balloon ride for him with his Albuquerque pilot friend, Bruce Hale. Giacomo was unable to travel to Albuquerque so Hale brought his balloon to Raton.

"Jarrod got his ride that lasted almost two hours," Balloon Life magazine reported three years later. "Bruce and his crew had such a great time in Raton with flying and fishing and hospitality that they decided to do an annual event. Thus the Santa Fe Trail Balloon Rally was born."



sorsoring individual balloons, the rally fielded as many as 32 balloons some years. Raton MainStreet intends to grow the annual event back to that size says Valentini, whose involvement goes back to 1997 when she became hooked on helping the balloon crews and chase vehicles. Each morning, several of the balloon pilots draft local spectators to help, which includes getting the balloon open and aloft, then chasing it to wherever it comes down.

Balloon sponsors are assured a balloon ride, but sometimes a volunteer crew member gets lucky with an opportunity to go aloft.

This year, International Bank continues its event sponsorship, with Northern New Mexico Gas Company sponsoring the propane that fuels the flights. Balloon sponsors are RBS True Value Hardware, Raton Rodeo Association, The White House Saloon,

CPA, and "In Memory of Jan P. Strnad."

Organizations pairing up to co-sponsor balloons are Vermejo Park Ranch, Title Services, Friends of Poetry Rocks!, Quest Realty, Pegasus Flight Services, Mayfield Marty Photography, and the Colfax County Senior Center.

The action begins early, at 5 a.m. Saturday and Sunday, with a pancake breakfast provided by Raton Kiwanis Club. DJ Ted Romero will spin music from that hour and Saturday morning KRTN-FM 93.9 will broadcast live from the event, including pilot interviews.

The mass ascensions are scheduled for 6 a.m., although the exact time is sometimes adjusted according to wind conditions. This year's pilots and their balloons are Royce Miller in Green Hornet, Gerry Graff in Lofty, Tom Gardner in Ajuua Dreamer, Gregory Garcia in Good Grief. Kenneth Paulk in Ducky. and Roger Hoppe in Volcanic Motion.

Others are Dave Aley in Dreaming in Color, Clarke O'Byrne in Viento Encantado, Neal Smith in First Light, David Fox in Ship O' Fools, Bill Dimmitt in Sunrise Angel, Linda Bonney in High Hopes, Cliff Keller in Lily, Keith Lutz in Sky Pirate, and Ken Ferguson in Firefly. Miller hails from Guymon, OK; the other pilots bring their balloons from Albuquerque or other spots in central NM.

Balloonmeister Tom Gardner's Ajuua Dreamer is featured in a special balloon-themed art show, "Up, Up, and Away," at Old Pass Gallery on South First Street, sponsored by Raton Arts and Humanities Council. The show will be up through July, with a reception Saturday from 1 to 6 p.m.

More than 20 homes flooded near site of last year's Waldo Canyon fire

MANITOU SPRINGS. Colo. — What was warned about for months since last year's deadly Waldo Canyon Fire in Colorado Springs finally happened: flash flooding near the burn scar that shoved debris into homes and moved vehicles.

More than a half inch of rain fell in less than 20 minutes Monday, causing mud to flow into 20 houses in Manitou Springs and western Colorado Springs. The downpour over the burn scar forced more than 160 people to briefly evacuate a low-lying trailer park, and it also closed U.S. 24 for several hours.

National Weather Service meteorologist John Kalina said the damage could have been much

worse if the storm had settled over the area. He said 0.59 inches of rain fell in less than 20 minutes.

"That's pretty intense rain rate, and that helped to cause the issues that we're seeing today," Kalina said.

"It was raining buckets and all of a sudden I heard this freight train," Tina Webber, who lives in Manitou Springs, told The Gazette.

"I came running around my house and I see this wall of water with this perfect white mattress on the front of it coming down the canvon.'

"It was an 8-foot wall of black debris and boulders and trees. There was no stopping it," Webber said.

The potential for flooding has worried officials since the June 2012 Waldo Canyon Fire burned 347 homes and killed two people. Authorities have said the fire was human-caused but have released no other findings.

El Paso County, Colorado Springs and Manitou Springs have held briefings for residents on the threat of flash flooding in the burn scar area.

In June, the U.S. Agriculture Department said it was sending nearly \$20 million to repair watersheds and mitigate flood potential in both the Waldo Canyon and High Park Fire burn areas. Work includes mulching, re-seeding and shoring up water channels.
