# Annual Candlelight Vigil to remember victims of domestic abuse, violence

When women suffer from abuse, they need a safe place they can turn to when they're in fear of further violence. Advocates Against Domestic Assault (AADA) will host a Candlelight Vigil to remember the victims of domestic violence.

The vigil will be held at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, October 22 at the La Quinta Inn & Suites, located at 2873 Toupal Drive. October is National Domestic Violence Awareness Month, and AADA invites the community to attend this commemorative event.

Charlene Tortorice, AADA director, said there would be a candle lighting ceremony, a balloon release and live music at the vigil.

'We would like to invite the community to come out and join us as we remember the victims of domestic violence at the candlelight vigil," Tortorice said.

AADA works to end violence through education and advocacy, and empowers people experiencing domestic violence to heal their lives. It's a 501(c) 3 nonprofit organization that's entirely supported by public and private grants, fundrais-

ers and donations.

AADA works to develop programs that help battered women who need assistance and address the immediate safety needs of women experiencing domestic violence. Among its goals are to provide supportive services, including advocacy, shelter, transportation and support groups, while working to empower all battered women to develop their full potential as selfsustaining people.

The agency supports domestic violence educational programs that serve children and adults who are the victims of domestic violence, while encouraging community values that sustain and promote a non-violent environment. AADA works to develop a coordinated community response to domestic violence with law enforcement, social service organizations, health and legal service providers, schools and ministerial associations, while providing information and referral services to all families on issues relating to domestic violence in Trinidad and the surrounding area. AADA envisions a unified community where violence is not tolerated and respectful relationships are highly valued.

AADA operates a 20-bed facility in Trinidad, where it began operations in 1986. Ten people work at the facility, which operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Last year AADA served approximately 600 people.

In addition to its own facility at 721 Madison St., AADA also has a transitional housing program in which domestic violence victims and their family members can live for up to two years in a service enriched environment. The program helps families move toward selfsufficiency by providing housing in a completely furnished apartment.

In 2013, AADA was successful in getting a grant to establish a Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) at Mt. San Rafael Hospital. This allows local nurses to be trained in forensic examinations of sexual assault victims, instead of having to have the exam done at a Pueblo hospital.

Many programs and services are offered to people suffering from domestic violence through AADA. Wednesday's candlelight vigil offers the public a way to remember the victims of domestic violence.

# Missouri brothers win Shuler Country Showdown

RATON - The Southwest Regional Country Showdown at the Shuler Theater Saturday night pitted seven state champions in a talent contest to send the southwest's best new country act to Nashville for a national final and the chance to beat four other regions' winners for the \$100,000 grand prize. In the end-and they were the last act to perform—The Brothers Roberson of Springfield, Missouri, swept the contest with their infectious feel-good camaraderie and accomplished per-

It could have crashed for them. Older brother Rhett Roberson's mic stand was faulty from the start, threatening to slide down in midperformance. Instead of growing flustered as the stage crew worked on the problem, the Roberson brothers turned it into an endearing comedy act. When they finally launched into their two-song mini-set, they just kept smiling, having so much fun that the audience couldn't resist smiling with them. Rhett segued from the mic stand fiasco to the first song by saying, "We're from Missouri. This is a song about loving a girl in Dallas. It's called 'Blame Oklahoma'.'

Many veteran professional en-

tertainers need at least two songs on stage to hit their stride and reach a level of comfort and confidence that allows the audience to enjoy their show. The Country Showdown requires young talents to step into a high-pressure environment and give all they've got within just two songs. It's a tribute to the young talent at the Southwest Regionals, held at the Shuler Theater for the last four years, that they've been so impressive within the confines of just two

Rhett Roberson played his Martin guitar and sang lead on songs he'd written while younger brother Brendan accompanied him on a vocals. They seemed to have so much fun doing it that they couldn't keep from breaking into infectious smiles. They often leaned close to each other as if sharing secrets, and the secrets appeared to be fun.

The Country Showdown "America's Number One Country Music Talent Search," and its goal is to find the most marketable new talent in the country. Songwriting is a tiny part of it—only 6 percent of the scoring—with judges looking for a whole package of musicianship, great voice and singing and even greater stage presence and audience appeal. Last year at the Shuler, the
