

## Book club turns deadly funny in Shuler comedy production

RATON – When the veteran actors of Raton High School's Mask & Wig Club mount the comedy

"Murder by the Book" at the Shuler Theater on the nights of Friday, literature will suddenly turn lively when a woman is discovered murdered just after making a book presentation.

Ten of the cast's 11 young actors have grown up on the Shuler stage March 21 and Saturday, March 22, through Raton's many youth theater programs. They bring their experience and talents to the story of a ladies literary society that meets for presentations and dis-

cussions of the great works of literature. The setting is the old Gurney House, a Midwestern mansion that once housed a wealthy family but has been restored and is now a museum and the home to the local historical society.

The closest the middle-aged women have ever been to murder is discussing a Stephen King novel. By the morning after the crime. however, they find themselves in the midst of a murder investigation conducted by the county sheriff and a sharp young police detective. Crowds gather outside the mansion to witness the most excitement the small town has experienced in ages.

That the suspects are eight dowdy book-club ladies makes the "who-done-it" engaging and fun. Readers and English teachers will enjoy the action even more for its abundant literary references. Christopher Marlowe's writings provide a key clue, and Marlowe's contemporary, William Shakespeare, is among the many authors mentioned.

Other references include Virginia Woolf and Sylvia Plath, along with Jane Fonda and the "Hallmark Hall of Fame" on PBS. Confusion between Christopher Marlowe and Raymond Chandler's Philip Marlowe gives an idea of the humor. The police detective's name is Roger Heming-

way, leading to abundant jokes Continued on Page 2 ...

### Councilmember Mattie reports good, bad, ugly

Trinidad has its positive and negative elements, just as every city does. Councilmember Anthony Mattie recently talked about a few things he'd heard about in the city, describing them as the good, the bad and the ugly.

Mattie's remarks came during Tuesday's City Council meeting under the agenda item that calls for each councilmember to talk about city-related meetings they've attended and what's going

on around town. Mattie said the good news was the Philanthropy Phair held at the Mitchell Museum last Saturday. "I spent a considerable part of that Saturday there, and it was encouraging to see Trinidad's best putting their best foot forward, Mattie said. "There were a lot of smiling faces with eager optimism who were touting the assets they have to offer our community, and I was very encouraged to know that. I think that it would be something every citizen of this community would do well to emulate. It was good practice for the Rural Philanthropy Days that's coming up here this fall."

Councilmember Michelle Miles

also praised the efforts of all those involved in the Philanthropy Fair.

Mattie next referred to the bad, saying a City Parks and Recreation Department employee had told him that he had to punch in at the time clock located at the Trinidad Community Center, then travel across town in his personal vehicle to the place where City work trucks and other vehicles were parked, before beginning work for the day. He said that practice was an inefficient use of the employee's time, and it would be better to put the time clock at Central Park, where much of the department's work is done.

'You have maybe eight people doing that and it might take 15 minutes, so that's two hours of productive time wasted in transit," he said. "Not to mention that they're on duty and traveling in

their personal vehicles, and who knows what legal complications might result from that if they're injured in an accident while driving their personal vehicles.

Mattie said the department could have an office, including a time clock, at Central Park. He said a plan to do just that had been approved by the Parks and Recreation Commission and City Manager Tom Acre last October and asked why nothing had been done about it.

Councilmember Joe Bonato agreed with Mattie's comments, saving it was time for the Parks and Recreation Department employees to have a working home.

Acre noted, after Mattie concluded his remarks, that there was a line item for such a project in the







### Governor's 2012 trade mission to Mexico

### Opportunities for Colorado potato farmers

DENVER — Gov. John Hickenlooper and the Colorado Department of Agriculture announced that Mexico has published new rules that permit expanded access to the Mexican market for U.S. fresh potatoes. This will allow producers in Colorado, particularly those in the San Luis Valley, to increase potato exports to Mexico.

"Agricultural exports have become increasingly important to our state's economy,' Hickenlooper "We have a strong partnership with Mexico and we are excited about the continued growth of these export markets." agricultural Colorado

exports continue to grow, nearly doubling since 2009. Mexico is Colorado's secondlargest agricultural export market. This step by Mexico will further strengthen that relationship, not only increasing exports of Colorado fresh potatoes to that country, but also potentially opening more opportunities for Colorado agriculture in general.

Expanded exports of fresh potatoes could have a positive economic impact of \$30 million for Colorado.

"This is great news for Colorado and for potato producers in the San Luis Valley," Commissioner of Agriculture John Salazar said. "We have been working to expand this market since 2003. I especially want to commend Gov. Hickenlooper on his leadership in helping make this day

happen."

Hickenlooper led a trade mission to Mexico in 2012 that focused on opening Mexico's interior market for potatoes. To date, only areas along the border have been accessible to U.S. potatoes. During the 2012 visit, the governor and Salazar met with Mexican President Felipe Calderon to press the case for potato-market expansion. The trade mission supported ongoing industry efforts to promote Colorado products in Mexico and helped to lay the foundation for this significant action by Mexico.

Shipments of Colorado potatoes increased 26 percent between 2012 and 2013. In addition, the export value of Colorado potatoes sold to Mexico grew to \$23 million in 2013 from \$17 million in

The release of this new rule comes at an opportune time as the Colorado Department of Agriculture, which recently exhibited with several Colorado potato companies at the 2014 ANTAD trade show March 12-14 in Guadalajara, Mexico.

"Our presence at AN-TAD will help us continue to develop market opportunities for potatoes and other Colorado agricultural products," Salazar said. "We will be able to network with buyers from some of the largest retail outlets in Mexico.

City's 2014 budget, listed under Capital Improvements Projects.

Mattie then turned to what he called the ugly. He said John Pearse, parish manager of Holy Trinity Catholic Church, had contacted him about getting a City letter of support for the parish's grant application for funds to repair its steeple, which was damaged by an earthquake in 2011. He asked why the City hadn't sent such a letter of support to the parish office. He said Pearse told him he'd asked Mayor Joe Reorda for his help in getting the letter several months ago but hadn't received it.

Mattie said Pearse told him about the situation last Friday, saying he needed the letter for the grant application by the following Tuesday. Mattie said Acre then called Pearse at Mattie's request, with Acre saying the City could write a letter of support for the steeple-restoration project. A City employee was assigned the task of writing the letter on Monday, but Mattie said Pearse told him on Monday that it was too late for the letter of support to be included in the grant application. Mattie said he was unhappy about how the situation had been handled.

'The point I'm painfully trying to make, controlling myself as I am, is that that's the ugly part," he said. "We should do a better job of this. We need to build partnerships. We need to work with

whenever possible, whether it's the hospital, the library, the college or the county, so that we work together to make good things happen. Damn it, we dropped the ball on this and it's ugly as hell. When all they needed from us was a letter of support for their grant application, with no other contribution from us, and we dropped the ball."

Mattie said Pearse came to him after failing to get a positive action from Mayor Reorda and he accused Reorda of acting rudely toward Reorda said he had no

comment on the issue of the letter of support. Councilmember

Bolton said the issue of a new home for the Parks and Recreation Department should have been brought before Council for a thorough discussion, saying a line item in the budget "was insufficient.'

Councilmember Fletcher said the liability involved in having City workers travel in their personal vehicles while on the City's clock was an issue that needed to be addressed immediately.
