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to sell you the concept of the new Welcome Center," Cimino said. "We're here to do our level best "We've been working on this for several years. We bought the property in 2009, and we've had a lot of conversation about it. There have been articles written about it, and the concept is intact.... Our plan is to build a state-of-the-art visitors center, and there's nothing else like this in Colorado, because the first thing you come to when you come over the Raton Pass is Trinidad, and then the visitors center. We've got potential partnerships with the State, and we obviously need partnerships with the City and County. Our plan is essen-tially for me to gift the land, the building and all the architectural plans to the City, once the City puts all the utilities in. The project is a lot more than the visitors center, but it is the beginning. It is the first part of the project, because it results in critical mass, where people come in and they start to spend money. The other issue is some of

the potential problems we're going to have here.

Karl Gabrielson, chief operating officer of the Mt. Carmel Health, Wellness and Community Center, described the new project. La Puerta de Colorado is a Spanish phrase that translates to Opening the Doors to Colorado, he said. The developers, Gabrielson said, had been in negotiations with the City for almost a year and had come up "with a true public/private partnership that we feel is the best approach." Gabrielson said the developers wanted Council's input on their plans to make Trinidad what he called "the Gateway to Colorado. "The plan is for the visitors center to be the gateway into the gateway, in a sense," Gabrielson said. "It would be the stopping-off point for what was, at one time, 160,000-plus visitors a year to the Colorado Welcome Center, and now it's down to somewhere in the 53,000 range, when the on- and offramps had been lost. We're hoping to bring that number back significantly, draw them into downtown and send them to wherever the community thinks the tourists should go.'

Councilmember Joe Bonato asked if the veterans' memorials at the present Welcome Center would be moved to the new site.

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WEALTH OF SEASONAL ACTIVITIES Trinidad History Museum to feature fun summer events

Once school lets out in late spring, many folks pack up the family car and hit the road for summer vacations. History Colorado's Trinidad History Museum, however, gives families plenty of reasons to swing by before or after their road trips. This summer the museum has numerous programs and events for both the local crowd and summer tourists.

The museum consists of the Baca House, the Bloom Mansion, the radiant Baca-Bloom Heritage Gardens and the Santa Fe Trail Museum, all contained in the 300 block of East Main Street. The museum is open from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. on Mondays through Saturdays, except for holidays, through September 30. The gardens are open for free, self-guided tours at 9 a.m. Maps are available at the iron gates on Chestnut Street.

The Great Colorado Coalfield War of 1913-1914 was one of the most tragic events in the state's history. The museum's free summer exhibit in commemoration of that event's centennial is titled "An American Icon: Louis Tikas and the Ludlow Massacre," and it's currently on display at the gallery next to the Museum Gift and Book Shop, located at 312 E. Main St.

A series of five workshops for kids, titled "Piecing Together His-

tory," will result in a colorful tile mosaic that will be unveiled at a public reception later this summer at the Tot Erickson Fountain in the museum's Old Barnyard Garden. Erickson helped found the museum, and her rich and colorful life will be discussed at the unveiling. Eight students are now in the design phase of the mosaic project.

Trinidad's early history dates back to the time of the Indian Wars in the 1860s and 1870s, when the African-American Buffalo Soldiers of the Ninth and 10th U.S. Cavalry Regiments became legends of the Old West for their success in fighting Indians. Several members of the Buffalo Soldiers (Horse) Cavalry Association will be at the museum at 1 p.m. on Sunday, July 20, for the unveiling of the new Cathay Williams Memorial Marker. Williams was the only woman known to have served as a Buffalo Soldier. She changed her name to William Cathay, dressed like a man and joined the Army in 1866. The oldest living Buffalo Soldier, Trooper Turl Covington of Denver, is expected to attend the event. Buffalo Soldiers served in separate, all-black units from 1866 until 1944. The association will
