# Shuler performance series opens with piano virtuoso

RATON – Acclaimed classical pianist Teresa Walters's website offers its content in a choice of eight languages—French, Italian, Spanish, German, Portuguese, Romanian, Chinese, and English. Her talent keeps her on the move throughout the world. Thursday night, she brings it to Raton for the opening show of the annual Performing Arts Series presented at the Shuler Theater by Raton Arts

& Humanities Council. Walters's recent concert venues have included Carnegie Hall and Lincoln Center in New York, Wigmore Hall in London, the Salle Cortot in Paris, and Moscow's Great Hall. Arriving during the Shuler Theater's centennial year, she may join the long list of worldtouring performers who have been inspired to find such a gem of a theater in such an unexpected lo-

performances of Liszt,

Tchaikovsky. Rachmaninoff, Beethoven, Schumann, George Gershwin have inspired the world's music critics. The New York Times said, "A musician ready, willing, and able, Teresa Walters tackled a program of large-scaled, big-boned pieces, and she sailed through them with an easy fluency that made each one sound like child's play.'

The London Times called her "an enormous talent." The Jerusalem Post critic wrote, "Her playing was marvelous, as close to perfect as I hope to hear." The Washington Post reported, "Teresa Walters is a splendid musician whose marvelous technical prowess and rich expressive resources create music of intimate introspection, orchestral grandeur, and the most minute inflections of color.

After a Walters concert, a Tokyo critic observed, "The audience left with a feeling of ecstasy, so spiritually powerful was her performance.

# Residents, visitors walk to increase awareness

This past Saturday, beginning in Cimino Park and going the length of the River Walk, from the Water Works Building all the way to North Linden Street and back, Mt. San Rafael Hospital and the Las Animas County Health Department hosted a collaborative community walk to raise awareness about diabetes.

Registered nurse and diabetes educator, Elvira Martin, talked about diabetes management and care. "Diabetes is a disease that you have to know what to do to manage it, diet, exercise, and medication.'

Type 1 Diabetes effects children and young adults. Type 2 Diabetes afflicts older adults. More and more, studies show that children and young adults are becoming susceptible to Type 2, and neither strain has a cure, only management and education of how to avoid the hormonal imbalance known as diabetes.

Lala Cabral is a cook at What a Grind Coffeehouse and Restaurant and a certified Piyo instructor, a workout that is a combination of pilates and yoga. Born and raised in Denver, her mother grew up in Sopris. She spoke about her mother's condition. "We don't carry the gene in our family, but I think it comes from stress and depression. Walters grew up on a farm in the American Midwest. At age four, she simultaneously began studying piano and a map of the world. Since earning a doctorate from Peabody Conservatory and a year of study in Paris, she and her husband have lived in New York City. They enjoy getting away to their lake cottage where Walters indulges her love of wildlife and bird watching. Her two cats apparently don't interfere. Her favorite cause is animal welfare.

Her touring schedule, however, suggests that she's not home much. She makes her living on the road, performing concerts for audiences around the world.

Thursday night's performance at the Shuler Theater begins at 7 p.m. Reserved seat tickets are \$20 for adults, \$15 seniors, and \$10 students, available at the door or in advance from Raton Arts & Humanities Council at Old Pass Gallery, 145 S. First St., (575) 445-2052. Six-show season tickets are available at \$80 for adults, \$65 seniors, \$40 students, or \$200 for a family of two adults and two students, with additional students \$20 each.

Jonathan Robinson is 12. He's had Type 1 Diabetes since he was eight. He and his mother, Valerie, talked about his condition. Valerie said, "He started throwing up a lot and way gray. He was thirsty and had to pee all the time. This went on for two weeks. We took him to his Pueblo pediatrician and they said, 'Keto acidosis,' diabetes. "He was in the hospital four days. They prescribed

an insulin called Humalog. There's no cure. He's going to have it forever."

There is even something called 'pregnancy diabetes.' Rebecca McClatchy moved from Berlin, Germany to be with her sister, Marsha Girdlestone. "They Rebecca said, don't know where it comes from, but I had it in the last two months of pregancy for both my sons, Leo and Christopher, then it just went away. I

don't know how that is. They say it happens with babies over 9 pounds. Both my sons were like that.

According to preventive literature on hand at the walk, "The risks for Diabetes are being overweight or over 45 years of age, having high blood pressure, or having a family, genetic disposition for the disease. A condition called insulin resistance increases the risk of contracting diabetes. With insulin resistance the body makes insulin, but does not use it effectively. When blood sugar

tes. I have to stay away from carbohydrates, like pasta and rice. I used to love chocolate.' He added, "There's a theory that says Hispanics are pre-disposed to diabetes because of our diet. A fat gene in Native Americans was passed on to us. We need education. That's why we're having the Diabetes Walk today. This younger generation plays video games, watches television. They're inactive, so risks for it for them are on the rise. My wife, Elvira, was diagnosed with Type 1 Diabetes when she was ten. She'd done a lot

in the field of diabetes education. I'm proud of her.'

Karen Lucas said, "I found out 15 years ago I have Type 2. I was having sugar crashes, highs and lows. In the last three years I've managed to get them leveled out. My A1Cs." the standard diabetes test, "have stabilized.

Fatima Pina is a dietician at Mount Saint Raphael Hospital. Raised in Germany, she received her B.A. and M.A. in Oklahoma. "I'm the hospital's Director of Nutrition," she said. "I plan the hospital menus. On the clinical side, I see in-patients at the hospital and advise out-patients by reference.

The Hispanic culture is highly susceptible to diabetes. When I do a diabetic consultation, I ask patients to come in with a realistic three-day diet recall, what they've eaten in the past three days. We look at that and make improvements.

Diet and exercise are the keys to preventing diabetes. Finding some way to be happy can also help immensely.

The American Diabetes Association says, "You can lower your risk for diabetes by losing only 7-percent of body weight, 15 pounds if you weigh 200 pounds. Physical activity as simple as walking 30 minutes a day, 5 days a week can be very helpful in curbing the risk of contracting diabetes.

The Diabetes Walk was over by 11 a.m., but the disease, its diagnosis, treatment, and education go on.


