Board supports DOLA Housing Grant program

Fixing up the aging housing stock in Trinidad and Las Animas County is a challenging proposition requiring significant resources to get the work done. The Las Animas County Board of Commissioners approved a letter of support for a grant funding application for the Community Development Block Housing (CDBG) program at Tuesday's Board meet-

ing.
The CDBG program is administered by the South Central Council of Governments (COG), and Stevie Medina, COG's housing director told the Commissioners about what the CDBG program had accomplished in recent years and what it hoped to do in the future, if it could acquire more grant funding. Funding is provided by the Colorado Department of Local Affairs (DOLA) through the Division of Housing's CDBG program and

Housing rehabilitation consists of repairing or updating the existing system or structural components of the property, including electrical, plumbing, heating system, foundation repair, roof, etc. The actual amount of repairs a home will need is determined from an inspection and evaluation report. Major emphasis is given to housing problems that affect the resident's health and safety, according to information from COG.

Leeann Fabec, county administrator, said the County had provided its support to the CDBG program for many years. "We do this on an annual ba-

sis," Fabec said. "We outline what our support is for South Central COG for their housing program." Medina said he was at the meet-

MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM

Classic opens at the Shuler on Thursday

Love, comedy mix

RATON - Love takes an antic spin through the forest in one of William Shakespeare's most popular comedies, "A Midsummer Night's Dream," a tale of young lovers, quarreling fairies and mistaken identities. The Shuler Theater presents Shakespeare's parallel plots and magical characters over the next two weekends when its summer repertoire company, Two Pigs Productions, presents the second of its three summer plays.

Eight cast members each take multiple roles as Shakespeare's complex and comic plots overlap and unfold in the green forest and under the light of a fairyland moon. Although they come from all over the U.S, and one from Great Britain, the actors joined the summer company through spring auditions in Chicago and Bloomington, Indiana.

Darren Hill, Tamara Todres, Blake White, Jim Stark, Bussy Gower, Cassie Thompson, and Nick Pappas all return to the Shuler stage from the just-closed "Into the Woods," joined by that production's director, Ian McCabe.

Director Daniel Lendzian, from Austin, TX, underscores in his program notes the production's extensive use of the color green, "the perfect complement for Shakespeare's lush, beautiful and poetic language. Green trees provide shade, dull the heat, and then bend into cool, romantic, humorous midsummer nights where lovers (re)connect, fairies fix squabbles and lowly peasants become stars in plays of their own making."

Lendzian worked with set and costume designer Nora Leahy and lighting designer Tony Penna to create his visual world in Shakespeare's forest, while McCabe contributed the show's sound design.

"A Midsummer Night's Dream" opens Thursday night, July 9, and continues through Sunday, July 19, with performances Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights at 7:30 p.m. and two Sunday matinees at 2:30 p.m. General admission tickets are \$20 for adults, \$15 seniors, and \$5 children, available at the door or in advance at the Shuler Theater, 131 N. 2nd St., (575) 445-4746, www. shulertheater.com.
