Postal Service Urges Colorado **Voters To Return Ballots on time**

All ballots must be received by County Clerks by Nov. 3

DENVER — The 2015 Colorado election process is underway and the United States Postal Service is urging citizens to mail back ballots now to ensure every vote is counted.

According to state law, County Clerks and Recorders must be in possession of the ballot no later than the close of polls on Tuesday, Nov. 3. Only ballots received by that date will be counted.

A Postmark does not count.

Earlier this month, millions of ballots were mailed to registered voters by election authorities.

USPS District Manager Selwyn Epperson, who oversees mail operations for the state, says Colorado postal employees are ready for the return of those ballots.

We've already processed thousands of ballots and are delivering them to the clerks and recorders in Colorado's 64 counties," said Epperson. "The Postal Service anticipates a large influx this week and we are ready to ensure each and every Colorado vote is counted this year.

As a reminder, all ballots require postage and in some instances extra postage is necessary because of weight.

There are also drop off locations in each county which are specified on ballot instructional material.

"The Postal Service has served a role in the very fabric of this nation for two and a half centuries," said Epperson. "We are honored to be part of the Colorado Election process.'

Hospital CEO notes challenges, opportunities ahead

Mt. San Rafael Hospital's Chief Executive Officer (CEO) John Tucker held center stage last week at the monthly noon luncheon hosted by the Trinidad & Las Animas Chamber of Commerce (TLACC). Tucker provided some information about the hospital's history, current level of service and plans for the future to the crowd of approximately 50 interested attendees at the lunch held in the Pioneer Room of the Sullivan Student Center on the campus of Trinidad state Junior College. Tucker said the hospital's board and staff were looking for feedback about what it could do to better serve the community.

The hospital is overseen by the Board of Directors of the Trinidad Area Health Association (TAHA), a nonprofit 501c3 organization, Tucker said and, along with its associated medical clinic, works to provide essential medical services to the people of Trinidad and Las Animas County through its status as a Critical Access Hospital (CAH). The hospital's status as a CAH allows it to receive cost-based
