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EDUCATION Smithey: New THS Principal looking forward to challenges

When the principal's job at Trinidad High School became available this year, Chuck Smithey said he was more than ready to return to Southern Colorado. Smithey was an employee of the Walsenburg School District from 2001-2009, and he and his wife, Marianne still had some business interests there. He's just been hired as Trinidad High School Principal, and said in a Thursday interview that he's looking forward to the challenges and opportunities of his new position.

He earned his Master's degree from Adams State College while teaching and coaching in Walsenburg, and then worked for the school district in Brush for a few years, while Marianne looked after the businesses in Walsenburg. Commuting back and forth wasn't a good option for the couple, who have three grown children, 13 grandchildren and two greatgrandchildren. Smithey said he liked what he'd seen of the educational atmosphere in Trinidad.

"I'll be honest with you. Every person I've met in Trinidad has been so positive," Smithey said. "They're looking forward. They don't look backward. They want to move forward and they want the best for the kids, and the best for the community. I've met a lot of people in a short period of time, and I'm very, very impressed with the community. They have a great staff and they have great kids.'

He was asked in what new directions he'd like to take the high school over the next few years. He said he wanted to continue along the present path the school's leadership had already established.

Well, the first thing I'm going to do is to build on the success they've had," he said. "I want to keep moving forward. Obviously, we want to be a highly rated school, and that's one thing that's always there. But the

RATON – Raton Main Street will kick off its summer series of free concerts in Ripley Park Sunday afternoon at 4 p.m. with two hours of classic cowboy and Western music from Syd Masters & The Swing Riders. The Music on Main Street concert series continues through August with seven more weekend concerts, all with no cover charge thanks to the generosity of Raton's Whited Foundation.

Syd Masters formed his band 18 years ago and has now toured though "half the states and 131 New Mexico towns." Based in Edgewood, NM, the band's constant touring and playing have honed its skills. The rhythms and harmonies are good enough that they've built a loyal fan base in Raton, where they've played the Ripley Park series and headlined last year's Independence Day Dance at the Raton Rodeo Harrelson Pavilion.

The last time they played Ripley Park, a cooling breeze swept down from the Raton Pass and right under the generous shade trees as 200 people spread out on blankets and lawn chairs to enjoy the show. The cowboy swing band combined well-received original songs with many classic cowboy songs that appeared to be enjoyed by people and dogs – of all ages.

Masters is a showman with between-song banter and tales, repartee with his band mates, songs that get the crowd swaying...and yodeling. His grandstand yodeling on his own "Galisteo Highway" was a great crowd-pleaser and a highlight of the last park concert. Beloved cowboy favorites such as "The Streets of Laredo", "Leav-ing Cheyenne", and "Cool Water" were interspersed with Masters' own songs, including "Under New Mexico Skies," which is "The Official Cowboy Song of the State of

Masters used frequent humor to entertain his last Ripley Park crowd. One of his songs had the lines, "Frying bacon in the nude/ That is what I like to do/ Because it reminds me of you." DENVER (AP) — A new law allowing Colorado cooks to sell homemade pickles is among five dozen new measures that have been signed into law by Gov. John Hickenlooper.

The governor's office announced the bill signings Friday. They include an expansion of the state Cottage Foods law, which allows home cooks to sell some items without seeking a commercial food license. The law had been limited to mostly homemade breads and jellies. The expansion adds pickled vegetables and fruit empanadas.

Other new laws include an update to Colorado's medical marijuana regulations, which were due to expire without action from the Legislature.

The governor also signed a law clearing the way for state universities to develop certified hemp seed. Currently growers of the new crop have difficulty acquiring seeds for the newly legal crop.

Colorado looking to drier weather, storm risk remains

DENVER (AP) — A soggy Colorado was looking forward to clearer, calmer skies over the next few days — though forecasters warned another Pacific storm could send a watery wallop next weekend.

Colorado would see more isolated afternoon storms in the next few days, forecasters said Sunday. That's after

a multiday pattern of intense, violent storms that have damaged homes and whipped branches to the ground.

The storms' first injury came Saturday, when a man was struck by lightning in Colorado Springs after a cricket match. The man, identified by witnesses as Venkat Ramani, was hospitalized with burns but expected to survive, KKTV reported.

"It looked like someone had taken a torch to his clothes," said Chris Ciccolella, who witnessed the strike and ran to help.

The series of violent storms included almost a dozen confirmed tornadoes since Thursday. No injuries were reported, though homes in Berthoud and on Colorado's Eastern Plains were damaged.

Two weak tornadoes touched down Saturday in southern Utah during slow, powerful storms that swept through the state.

The storms moved into the northern and central Plains, including in the Dakotas, Nebraska and into parts of Minnesota and Iowa. On Sunday, central Iowa residents picked up fallen tree limbs and dealt with other minor damage from the overnight storms. The storms knocked down trees and traffic lights with 55 mph winds.

The storms were the result of the El Nino phenomenon in the Pacific Ocean, an upper-level jet stream and a low-pressure system parked over

some ways, though. Hydrologists with the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation have been able to release surplus water from reservoirs above the Upper Colorado River to mimic natural spring runoff.

That's about the opposite of what reservoir operators typically do as they try to store water for times of drought, prevent floods and generally even out flows throughout the year,

Colorado pikeminnow

Forecasters say another Pacific storm could deliver rains by the end of the week. Hurricane Blanca was headed Sunday for Mexico's Baja California Peninsula. Forecasters say Blanca could produce more rains in Colorado by Thursday or Friday, a special concern in areas prone to flooding and in sections of the state still lacking ground cover after wildfires in 2013.

The rains have been good news in

the Summit Daily News reported.

"We hydrologists were just so happy with all this rain," said Jana Mohrman, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service hydrologist with the Upper Colorado River Endangered Fish Recovery Program.

The program works to improve water flows for four endangered fish species — the humpback chub, razorback sucker, bonytail and the Colorado pikeminnow.

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
