attending Director Harriet Vaugeois' first Saturday class on January 3, will be transformed into lovers and fairies, an amorous donkey, and the mischievous Puck by the time Opening Night arrives.

What a wonderful opportunity for the kids to learn life skills in a fun way. They will learn to work together with a "family" of other kids and grownups to achieve a wonderful result—a famous play to present to the Trinidad public. It's the real deal.

Participants will have to memorize lines, a skill that will develop brainpower, helpful for acing tests in school and staving off dementia in old age. They will have to follow

instructions, (very helpful for impressing future bosses or current teachers.) Here are a few more life skills, among a long list of positive results from participating in the-atre classes:

Benny and Angie ran the Isis Theatre in Downtown Trinidad, along with the Naccarato family. After the theatre closed, Angie became a well-known fixture in Trinidad's downtown retail community, working as a clerk at several local stores. She and Ben enjoyed their retirement together until Ben's death in 1993.

Angie became a teacher's aide at Trinidad HeadStart through the Foster Grandparent program. She had a special way with troubled and special needs children who blossomed and flourished under her love and kindness. She loved each of the children in her classes and they truly made Grandma Angie's life as special as she made theirs.

Angie had a special love for her grandchildren. She spent much time caring for and showering love upon her grandchildren. Her loving

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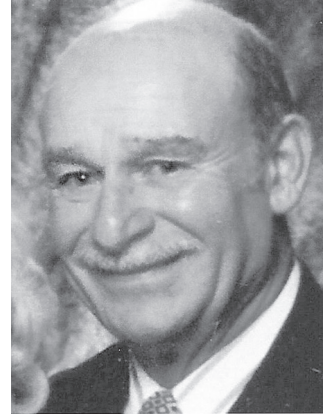

TIME FOR A VACATION

Strong dollar makes world travel cheaper for Americans

DALLAS (AP)—Trips in Europe or Asia should be cheaper for Americans this year.

Thank a stronger dollar. Since the middle of last year, it has been gaining against the euro, the British pound, the Swiss franc, the Russian ruble, the Indian rupee, the Japanese yen and other currencies.

That means dollars go further in those countries, reducing the price of everything from a hotel room to a glass of beer.

"This is one of the best times for Americans to travel in years," says Matt Kepnes, author of "Travel the World on \$50 a Day" and other travel books.

WHY THE DOLLAR IS STRONG

Other economies are shaky, making their currencies less valuable. Europe is barely growing. Japan is already officially in recession. China's growth has slowed. Meanwhile, the U.S. economy has been chugging along. Many economists expect that steady U.S. growth will compel the Federal Reserve to raise interest rates later this year, making dollar investments more attractive and leading traders to sell other currencies and buy dollars.

WHAT IT MEANS

Let's say that in June you had a charming dinner for two in Paris for 75 euros. First, congratulations. Second, it cost \$103 then; today it would be \$89. Expensive countries may not be cheap, but at least they're more affordable now.

BEST BARGAINS

Thanks to the pound's decline, England is cheaper than it was six months ago. But the euro has slumped more, making most of continental Europe an even better bargain.

Travel writer Kepnes says Greece is attractive right now because hotels and tour operators have been slashing prices to fill rooms. The same thing is happening in Portugal and parts of Spain.

"Be the contrarian traveler," Kepnes says. "If you want to go to Europe, consider eastern or central Europe, where prices are generally cheaper," he says. He recommends going during the "shoulder season" — late spring or early fall — rather than in summer, which is peak season.

WHEN TO BOOK A FLIGHT

Demand for travel is so strong that most airlines don't have to cut prices to sell seats. "The summer fares are still very expensive," says George Hobica, founder of travel website airfarewatchdog.com. But airlines might cut prices this spring if the strong dollar discourages Europeans and Asians from flying to and from the U.S.

CONSIDER ALL THE OPTIONS

Hobica recommends checking foreign airlines. He says Etihad, Qatar Airways, Turkish Airlines and others sometimes offer better prices to Europe than U.S. carriers do, although they could include a distant stopover.
