The collection includes many styles ranging from purely representational to abstract. All the works are from the artist's personal collection-his "children" that have lived

with him for many years. "I've never shown them all at the same time. In fact, I believe this might be my first one-man show," said Ferolie, describing this month's exhibit.

Matthew was born and raised in New York City, and he took his early art training at various institutions in the city. He received his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in 1966, and in 1970 moved from New York with

The festival will return for a second go-round next April. New Mexico Gunfighters, below right, came from Albuquerque to entertain with four highly entertaining shows and lots of gunplay evoking the spirit of the Rawhide TV show.

I'd hoped for, representing the start of the city's inaugural Rawhide Days with a herd of cattle parading down the 2.5-mile length of Main Street, Tucumcari's piece of America's storied Mother Road, Route 66.

The cattle had been trucked in all the way from the Cross T Ranch at Bandera in the Texas Hill Country. The guy at the Port of Entry in San Jon learned that half of them were new additions, headed to their first parade, unpredictable. Yet two mounted cowboys and one long straight blacktop kept them perfectly in line. Like parade pros, the cattle walked at parade pace, never racing ahead, although organizers had put them at the front of the parade just in case.

A cattle drive was the

Besides a rope, his props included horses,

ducks, a buckboard wagon, his daughter

and lots of kids from the crowd.

TV show Rawhide, which spent six weeks filming around Tucumcari during 1959, its first of eight seasons on the air. A perpetual trail drive was interrupted each week by some trouble presented to the drovers, usually from a town they were passing. Born in Tucumcari, actor Paul Brinegar played the crew's cantankerous cook, Wishbone. Raised just up Route 66 in Oklahoma, actor-singer-cowboy Sheb Wooley played the scout

Wooley taught the new guy to ride a horse: Playing impetuous young Rowdy Yates, Clint Eastwood rode the part to stardom. The old motel next to where I stayed at the Blue Swallow still has a banner hanging outside—"Clint Eastwood Stayed Here."

Pete Nolan.

Clint's firstborn, daughter Kimber Eastwood, rode right past the banner as she took a selfie saddled atop one of the Texas Longhorns in the parade. She in from Los Angeles for Rawhide Days. Sheb Wooley's daughter came too, and Paul Brinegar's wife and son.

For two days last weekend, Tucumcari celebrated its Rawhide heri-Restautage. rant staff wore cowboy hats sheriff's and badges. Horseback riders of all ages followed the longhorns down Route 66

The 1937 art deco Odeon Theater screened first-season episodes of Rawhide all afternoon for free (switching over at night to Batman vs. Superman). Tucumcari Historical Museum hosted singers, historians and enFaron Young's son Robyn Young, and Hank Williams' daughter, Jett Williams, all of whom came from Nashville to sing and tell stories to a seated crowd of 500 that bought \$20 tickets to enjoy drinks and the show.

While it snowed in Trinidad and Raton, only a passing 30-minute storm cell at noon Saturday punctuated a festival weekend of sunny skies and big white photographers' clouds. New Mexico Gunfighters came from Albuquerque, where they present eight shows in Old Town every month, to entertain crowds with their comic skits and piercing gunfire. Many others wandered the festival grounds in Western costumes, including outlaws, law dogs and bawdy saloon girls.

The Miss Rawhide Days pageant included some playful gunfire, too, from Tucumcari native Dana Alarcon who returned from her Amarillo home to win the title. It was her mother, Karen Alarcon, who last summer hatched the idea for Rawhide Days when she was talking on her KTNM Ranch Radio show about Rawhide's 1959 stay in Tucumcari. The

town's done well capitalizing on Route 66, neon and murals-why not Rawhide?

Rawhide Days filled the convention center parking lot early each day, sending latecomers to satellite

parking lots and suggesting that the new Rawhide Days is here to stay, returning each April.

For an inaugural event, the variety of attractions was impressive. Trick roper Brice Chapman came from Lubbock to give two shows each day, using not only ropes but also horses. ducks, a buckboard wagon,

his daughter Grace and a passel of kids from the audience. When they weren't enjoying costumed Old West characters walking the grounds, many kids tried their luck on a mechanical bull—causing some to laugh and a few to



At the edge of the convention grounds just past the Old West saloon and bank, one of the Texas Longhorns posed for pictures with giddy kids and their parents. A few people even posed standing on a saddle atop the patient longhorn. A Tucumcari Police Department officer smiled from a distance. He needn't have worried about the longhorns. Like everyone else, they were perfectly well-behaved visitors to the first Tucumcari Rawhide Days.
