

CDBG Grant to continue in Las Animas County

Last Tuesday at the Las Animas County Commissioners meeting John Anderson Housing Director at the Council of Central Governments (SC-COG), attended a hearing to close out a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) with Las Animas County, this bi-county housing award will now be sponsored by Huerfano County

The CDBG award will still be available in Las Animas County.

This CDBG grant for the past 10 years has had the same dollar amount of \$329,049 to provide family owner occupied homes for housing rehabilitation.

The money comes from the CDBG.

This is specific to housing and is aimed towards improving safety around the home. The grant helps with safety improvements and core elements in the home like fixing roofs, plumbing, electrical, and anything that makes a home safe.

80 percent of the approved money for construction must be used for safety and health issues. While 20 percent home. Homeowners can also use some of the funds for extra little things relat-

ed to improving safety in their home. In this program SC-COG offers, a loan portfolio that goes with it. Then a loan advisory committee in both Las Animas and Huerfano Counties recommend those who qualify for the AMI programs. The next step is to

look at bids from local contractors. When a bid is accepted a contract between the contractor and the homeowner is watched over by SC-COG who then watches over the money. When the project(s) are completed the contract is closed out and the applicant starts to pay back the loan. This then becomes a revolving loan. The payments made to the loan are used to can be used for aesthetics around the build capital in the fund making more money available to help more individuals fix more homes.

There is now over \$3 million in the bi-county revolving loan program. Once again, even though Huerfano County is now sponsoring the grant, qualified residents in Las Animas County are still able to use the grants monies.

Discussions led by new chamber President Dave Grove will focus on how local businesses, merchants and government need to come together with an exchange of ideas and action plans to survive the current deteriorating local and national economic crunch.

Grove recently initiated discussions with other businessmen and local contractors that led to organizing the meeting. Grove then sought answers regarding community complaints over high local prices charged by merchants, why many Trinidad residents shop elsewhere and to generate ideas on how to improve the city's overall business climate.

The resulting meeting will be a networking event allowing businesses, community members and government leaders to voice their ideas, discuss potential solutions, what has previously worked and to explore avenues to help all Trinidad and Las Animas County residents survive the nation's current severe and worsening recession.

Community leaders will be asking meeting participants such questions as: "What can I do to help me and my neighbor businesses sustain ourselves during the economic struggle the nation faces during the ongoing recession?; can you offer price discounts until the tide changes; can you promote sister businesses or find a way to hire local businesses rather than an out-of-town firm?; can you purchase needed products and supplies from a local business rather than a national franchise or online?; will de-Brucing help the local economy or are there other answers that might ease the cur rent economic crunch?; How can local contractors be more competitive for area projects and contracts?; is someone experiencing a problem your business has the answer for?; how can I improve customer service?; what are my short and long-term plans and what do I have to offer my communi-

"Our hope is that this forum will provide us the venue to share our best ideas to keep money in Trinidad, increase tax revenue to the city and county, offer discount benefits to local businesses and customers and keep afloat those businesses dependent on the gas and oil industry until the sluggish economy picks up again," said Grove in his first chamber newsletter Continued on page 2

Prison disturbance update

On the afternoon of Wednesday, Dec. 31, 2008 at approximately 2:15 p.m., a fight broke out at the Trinidad Correctional Facility east of Trinidad in what officials are calling a "minor disturbance'

According to reports on New Year's Eve, prisoners at the facility started arguing over weights in the yard subsequently which led to a fight. Within minutes the disturbance was controlled.

All 450-plus imamates at the TFC were put on lock down for five days until Monday, Jan. 5.

Reports indicate that 35 prisoners were involved in the fight. One inmate was injured. No guards were hurt.

Some of the individuals that were involved in the fight were transported to various correctional facilities in Cañon City later that day.

The incident is still under investigation.
