
Annual Des Moines health fair arrives Wednesday morning

April always signals the arrival of two things in Des Moines: spring, and the annual health fair which will be held next Wednesday morning, April 8, 2009, from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. in the Des Moines EMS building at 77 North Olive Street, behind the Des Moines firehouse and across Highway 64/87 from the post office.

As always, Union County General Hospital will have a team at the health fair to administer a menu of available tests. For most, they draw a blood sample and take it back to the lab at the hospital for testing. Results are sent directly to the person tested and are usually received the following week. Many people then take the printout of results to their primary care physician to accompany a regular physical examination. Others learn to read the simple results themselves to monitor their own health status.

The test fees are reduced 72% to 86% for the health fair, to \$35 or less depending on the test, and most insurance policies will reimburse all or part of the cost. Tests are available for cholesterol, blood type, lipid profile (for heart risk), thyroid, prostate, diabetes, iron, and vitamin D, among others. Most popular are some combinations of the above tests, for \$25 to \$35. For accurate results, one should fast for 8-12 hours prior to the test, having no food and drinking only water. Healthy nut

bread and other foods and juices are available at the health fair itself, so one can break their fast right there.

As always, EMTs will be available from the Des Moines, Capulin, and Folsom Emergency Medical Services to provide additional services free of charge. These check-ups include blood pressure, heart rate, blood sugar level, and oxygen level in the blood.

A tip to first-timers: there is usually a line forming outside by 7:30 a.m., but by 9:30 or 10:00 a.m. there is no line and people

are able to walk right in and be tested.

The annual Des Moines health fair is a non-profit, public service event funded strictly by donations. Donations may be given at the event directly to the Emergency Medical Services and/or Health Fair Committee c/o the County Extension Office in Clayton.
