

# Mitchell Museum features two local artists

The A.R. Mitchell Memorial Museum in downtown Trinidad is featuring two local artists' photography in this month's show titled, "Distance..... the Northeastern Corner of New Mexico. The show runs through May 23 with a catered reception on May 8 from 5:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. during which patrons and guests will meet the artists Tim Keller and **Rick Smith**.

The photography from the two artists that graces the walls of the museum for this show highlight the beauty, grace, ruggedness and some of the history of southeastern Colorado and northeastern New Mexico. Keller's entries in the show include nineteen framed pieces that were all shot in New Mexico. They range in size from small, 6" x 9", to very large, 20" x 30" and include locations and events that many, who live in this corner of the world, will recognize. Titles like

thoughts of days gone by. Several of Keller's photographs were shot with the beautiful view of Capulin National Monument and areas surrounding the volcano. And, many of Keller's photographs include a ranching theme, like the "Driving on Blacktop" photos that have been featured in January 2009 Western Horseman magazine of a horse drive on Johnson Mesa and "Fuego," which captures the intensity of branding irons. The use of old machinery and single structures give Keller's pieces a feeling of the loneliness that must have been felt by many ranchers and pioneers over the years.

Keller grew up in southern California, riding the waves, and hanging out on the beach. His interest in photography started with borrowed, old 35 mm cameras, but really grew into more than a hobby when he purchased his first digital camera, a Nikon D300 digital SLR. Rick Smith, a native of Colorado, has over thirty pieces entered in the "Distance...' show at the Mitchell, many that he describes as "digital painting." Living in the shadow of the Spanish Peaks, outside of Trinidad, has given Smith an opportunity to capture the beauty of Fisher's Peak, which towers over the city, with his digital painting of "Fisher's Peak II". Smith says that he tries to capture on paper and canvas "some of the most beautiful and inspiring country in the world." And, he believes that "art is mainly about feeling, or I other words, seeing with the heart rather than with the eye..." Other western themes are suggested in "Indian Paint Brush," "Little House on the Prairie," "Western Gentlemen," and many others. ## New Mexico State Parks hosts special events in May for Heritage Preservation Month

SANTA FE, N.M. - New **Mexico State Parks announces** its participation in the annual New Mexico Heritage Preservation Month in May. Each year, the New Mexico Historic Preservation Division, Department of Cultural Affairs, launches a month-long program to celebrate and draw attention to New Mexico's heritage and to community preservation efforts throughout the state.

More than 45 communities will sponsor almost 100 different special events during the 2009 Heritage Preservation Month, and NM State Parks is proud to be a participating partner. Six state parks will host special programs about the cultural heritage of our region. Most of these programs will not be repeated at other times during the year.

The schedule of Heritage Preservation Month events at NM State Parks is as follows:

May 7-10 – Living Desert Zoo and Gardens State Park in Carlsbad hosts the 23rd Annual Mescal Roast and Mountain Spirit Dances. This award-winning cultural event brings Mescalero Apaches to the park to

perform traditional ritual observances and dances. Mescal, a type of century plant, was the staple of the Mescalero Apache diet and has spiritual and cultural significance to them.

The event begins on Thursday, May 7 at 10 a.m. with the Pit Blessing, when the heads of mescal are placed in the mescal pit to roast. Both Friday and Saturday feature a Native American arts and crafts sale, an interpretive roundtable at 2:00 p.m., and the Apache feast dinner at 6 p.m. followed by the Apache War Dances and Mountain Spirit Dances. The event concludes Sunday with the mescal pit opening at 11:00 a.m. and the mescal tasting and closing ceremonies.

May 9 - Oliver Lee Memorial State Park Alamogordo, sponsors Heritage Preservation Day; 9 a.m.

4 p.m. The natural resources of Dog Canyon have enabled human occupation for 10,000 years. Discover the natural, cultural and historical resources of Oliver Lee Memorial State Park at this annual park event.

Experience the beauty and history of Dog Canyon and the Tularosa Basin.

May 16 – Pancho Villa State Park in Columbus presents Pancho Villa's Motives; 10-11:30 am. Why did the Mexican revolutionary Pancho Villa raid Columbus in 1916? There are many theories behind the raid by Pancho Villa's troops and several of the most plausible will be reviewed in this oral presentation.

May 16 - Cerrillos Hills State Park in Cerrillos presents The Most Recent 34 Million Years; 9 a.m.: Historian Bill Baxter will lead an interpretive walk and present the fascinating history of Cerrillos Hills from their molten beginnings to Puebloan, Spanish and Territorial times. There are a lot of holes in these here hills and visitors will hear the claim jumpin', shootin' tales behind these small mines. The walk is 2-3 miles at a leisurely pace but it is likely to be hot, so bring hats, sunscreen and water.

May 21 - Elephant Butte Lake State Park near T or C presents To Build a Dam; noon. This is a 45-minute slide presentation on the history of the construction of Elephant Butte Dam. No event had a greater impact on the Lower Rio Grande in New Mexico than the construction of Elephant Butte Dam. The program will cover three historic periods: actual dam construction

(1911-16); the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) and Roosevelt's New Deal (1933-41); and the current era of New Mexico State Parks (1965 - present). The presenter is Kevin Hansen, Southwest Region interpretive ranger for NM State Parks.

May 23 - Sugarite Canyon State Park near Raton hosts its Coal Camp Days Walk, 10:00 am. This is an hour-long walk through a 1930s coal camp to meet the local residents. Chat with a coal miner and the folks at the company store and ask the camp doctor about his remedies. Meet the woman who makes bread for the town and try her wares. Discover what folks really did at the clubhouse on a Saturday night!

social work from the 4-year-old program. Thirteen more students will graduate from the innovative program in May, including Joey Silva.

"I think having the students and faculty here from Mexico enriched me and our social work program," Silva said.

Ortega said Highlands is also partnering with social work programs at the University of Texas at El Paso and Arizona State University to develop exchange programs. In addition, the Highlands' program has become a model for other university's looking to develop similar programs.

She said graduates of the university's bilingual social work program are in demand, giving Silva as an example of just one student who has already received several job offers.

NMHU's School of Social Work is the oldest school of social work in New Mexico, dating back to 1974.
