

DENVER (AP) - Funeral services are planned Friday in Aurora for a Colorado native who died fighting in Afghanistan.

Petty Officer 3rd Class Anthony Garcia was killed Aug. 5 when his vehicle was hit by an improvised explosive device in the Farah Province of Afghanistan. The Hospital Corpsman was 21.

Gov. Bill Ritter has ordered flags at state and federal buildings to fly at half-staff Friday. Ritter plans to attend the funeral service, having met Garcia on a 2007 trip to Iraq. Burial is Friday at Fort Logan National Cemetery.

Gates: 'A few years' of combat in Afghanistan

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Pentagon presented a grim portrait of the Afghanistan war Thursday, offering no assurances about how long Americans will be fighting there or how many U.S. combat troops it will take to win.

Defeating the Taliban and al-Qaida will take "a few years," Defense Secretary Robert Gates said, with success on a larger scale in the desperately poor country a much longer proposition. He acknowledged that the Taliban has a firm hold on parts of the country President Barack Obama has called vital to U.S. security.

Congress wants answers to what lawmakers described as basic questions to soothe a war-weary American public.


Folsom Museum presents Morrow Chautauqua

FOLSOM - When they moved into their big five-bedroom house on North First Street in Raton in the 1890s, Fannie Dale Morrow asked her husband John why they needed such a big house. He replied that there was no better investment they could make in

such a solid and growing town. The Morrows went on to have five children - Ruth, James, John, Raymond, and Mary - while Fannie partnered with John as he became known as "Honest John" in careers as teacher, school superintendent, attorney, New Mexico legislator, and United States Congressman. They founded Gate City Building and Loan in Raton, and created a dynasty of descendants that today spreads from Raton to Folsom, Capulin, Des Moines, and beyond.
