Council approves ordinance to keep medical marijuana outlets from operating in city

Municipal Power Pool, the umbrella organization for NPGA. Harmes outlined in detail all the ifs, ands, buts, pros and cons, as well as the high and low-end risks involved should Trinidad decide to participate in the PGP for the purpose of developing future natural gas reserves. By joining the partnership with other national municipalities, the city would align with experienced national drilling and producing gas companies who could provide much-needed future natural gas reserves at lower costs and competitive prices to help offset future gas market volatility situations.

But as Harmes pointed out, four primary risk factors are involved in terms of production prices, operating costs, cash flow and financing risks and how the city would go about bidding on those risks during the bidding process in securing gas well production sites as well as the future value of that well production in acquiring its future gas reserves. If the price of gas goes up on the market, the city makes money. But if the price goes down, the city loses, Harmes noted.

Soltis also expressed concern at the meeting over possible liability issues for the city to consider if the PGP plan fails to live up to its billing. And there are no guarantees how many cubic feet of natural gas each well under contract might produce. Natural gas prices in recent years have also tended to wildly fluctuate up and down due to changing market conditions. Harmes also explained that the proposed PGP plan is not a fixed-price program and for member cities to go out and buy future reserve gas supplies involves operating on gas drilling companies' profit margins and futures price hedging situations.

Harmes said the first two gas reserves pool developed under the plan with other member municipalities around the country have been successful in obtaining lower prices and good benefits. Trinidad would be joining pool 3 with around 12 other municipali-

Soltis said council would discuss the plan's pros and cons of joining such a pool at a future workshop session.

Also under discussion Tuesday was a possible local bear problem that the city needs to do more research on and talk to local trash haulers to determine if more bear-proof trash dumpsters might be needed around town. An Allendale area resident recently reported seeing a large bear in her yard scouring around for food.

Bear sightings in and around town and along the Purgatoire River this time of year have been fairly frequent in recent years as hungry bears forage for food in preparation for winter hibernation. The city has no current ordinance to deal with potential scavenging problems. Soltis said he would research the matter to better determine possible action the city and the Division of Wildlife can take to alleviate the bears making public nuisances of themselves.

In other city action, council voted to approve the Trinidad Police Department's U.S. Department of Agriculture grant application to purchase another five community surveillance cameras in addition to the five already operating in the community over the past several months that have led to several criminal activity arrests while serving as a prime crime deterrent.

Council also formally approved the first reading of an ordinance that will lower the price city consumers pay on their natural gas supply charges in their monthly utility bills due to declining market and futures gas prices, effective Dec. 1. The new city rate that will be in effect at least for the next year will reflect a supply cost of 37.91 cents per 100 cubic feet instead of the 71.68 CCF rate customers had been paying.

Council also denied an extraterritorial water tap purchase request by the North Fork Land Owners Association and a resale to another party of a water tap owned by Lenny Lyons.
