Mandala Center's Gaye Brown to retire

When The Mandala Center gives its Executive Director Gaye Brown an open house and farewell party Thursday, July 9, from 3 to 7 p.m., Brown will be able to reflect on 35 years of service directing three programs in as many states. Although Brown says, "I'm retiring," the plan she

describes sounds like semi-

retirement at best.


"I really want to serve a church full-time. That's why I became ordained, so I could serve in a different kind of ministry," she explains. But she will slow down. "I want to go home to North Carolina. I have eleven beautiful acres there with an orchard I've been working on for five or six years. I've been going back twice a year. I have flower beds and I plant trees. If I don't do it now, I'll be too old to do it.'

Since taking over leadership of The Mandala Center, on a high shoulder of Sierra Grande mountain three miles west of Des Moines, NM, in 2000, the ecumenical retreat center has more than doubled the number of guests it serves annually, while the number of overnight occupancies has increased by more than 400%.

Anna Wolfe, founder of The Mandala Center and President of its board of directors, provided The Chronicle-News with the following words of praise for what Brown has accomplished here:

'Gaye has been a transformative force at The Mandala Center for over nine years now, taking it from a good idea that no one knew about to a retreat center that is known in many parts of this country. She arrived in April of 2000 with enthusiasm to throw her heart and soul into bringing people here to experience the potential for personal transformation that can occur, and she leaves with an even greater appreciation for the place. Gaye recognized that The Mandala Center serves as a place of hospitality, where people can come and listen to "the small still voice", to find direction or possibilities for their lives, and she has done an amazing job of creating programs and promoting the Center. Attendance increased greatly under her leadership, as people now come to the center not just from the region, but from all over the country. We will always be grateful for her dedication and hard work that has made all this possible."

Brown served as Executive Director **Episcopal** of Community Services in Arizona for ten years, managing a variety of church-based social service projects including refugee resettlement, child care centers, a food bank, reassurance programs for older adults, and health clinics. Prior to that, she lived Houston,

where for 15 years she managed programs for a large non-profit organization. She was responsible for long-range planning, proposal development and grant writing, budget development and management, staff selection, training and supervision, and the design and development of new programs. These experiences made her a perfect fit for leadership of the relatively new retreat center on the hill in northeastern New Mexico.

Asked to account for her success in dramatically growing the services of all three of the organizations that she has led, Brown says, "It's from putting together and sustaining a good work team, having strong outreach, emphasizing the importance of a ministry of hospitality and sharing God's love with all who come, paying attention to details in all aspects of our work, and offering programs of the highest quality.

She adds, "These are also essential to achieving church growth," -- which perhaps doesn't bode well for an imminent life of leisure tending her North Carolina flower beds, harvesting the fruit of her orchard. Brown was ordained to the priesthood of the Episcopal Church at Holy Trinity Church in Raton last December.

"I'll probably end up doing something similar in North Carolina to what I've done here in New Mexico," Brown admits.

"I have already found myself thinking, 'How can I bring this speaker, or that presenter, to North Carolina to give a program?' I love spending time with them and learning from

So, why North Carolina? She explains, "I grew up in North Carolina but I haven't lived there since I graduated from college. The land I have was my great grandfather's." Looking in any direction from her eleven acres, she'll be able to see the homesteads of relatives - her sister, cousins, second cousins and more cousins. She got a kick having a neighbor approach her in the store there recently to ask, "Say, aren't you one of the Brown girls?"

Not that leaving The Mandala Center is easy for her. "I've been writing my last newsletter. I've been saying goodbye. The way I say goodbye is to say 'Thank you,'" Brown says. "It's going to be hard to leave. The overwhelming feeling I have is gratitude."

Thursday afternoon, Gaye Brown will greet the friends she's made in northeastern New Mexico when The Mandala Center throws its "Open House and Farewell Party" from 3 to 7 pm. Along with refreshments, there will be lots of memories going around, and Brown will be both giving and receiving a constant refrain - "Thank you."
