Today is Tuesday, March 16, the 75th day of 2009. There are 290 days left in the year.

Highlights in history on this date:

- 1844 - Greece adopts Constitution with two chambers.
- 1850 - Nathaniel Hawthorne's novel "The Scarlet Letter" is published in the United States.
- 1851 - Spanish Concordat with Papacy goes into effect, whereby Catholicism becomes sole faith in Spain and Church gains control of education and the press.
- 1934 - Rome protocols signed between Italy, Austria and Hungary to form Danubian bloc against Little Entente of Czechoslovakia, Romania and Yugoslavia.
- 1935 - Germany repudiates disarmament clauses of Versailles Treaty that ended World War I.
- 1945 - Japanese resistance to U.S. assault on Iwo Jima in Pacific comes to end in World War II.
- 1995 - In a first for Russian-American cooperation in space, a Soyuz space capsule carrying an American astronaut docks with the orbiting Russian space station Mir.
- 1996 - Thousands of civilians flee the Chechen town of Samashky as Russian artillery shells rain down on their homes.
- 2003 - Anti-war protesters demonstrate across the United States to show their support for peace, including an estimated 10,000 protesters in Chicago.

2005 - Syrian military intelligence agents leave Beirut, ending an 18-year presence in Lebanon.

2006 - Thailand's Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra vows to lead his party to victory in an upcoming election despite widespread street protests demanding he step down.

2007 - China's legislators pass a law providing the most sweeping protection for private businesses and property since the nation's move toward a more capitalist-style economy beginning in the late 1970s.

2008 - Four Belgian tourists held hostage by protesting farmers are released after security forces in boats and helicopters locate the group in Guatemala's eastern jungle.

2009 - Iran's most prominent reformer former President Mohammed Khatami pulls out of the race against the country's hard-line president, saying he does not want to split the pro-reform vote.

Shuler crowd comes to the Cabaret

from former American Idol contestant Zac Mordechai as the Emcee, but marred by a strident Sally Bowles, as performed by Oakley Boycott.

At the dawn of the 1930s, Berlin's Kit Kat Klub has created its own amoral world; its denizens are so deeply immersed in their drunken partying that they remain oblivious to the rise of Hitler right outside their insular little world. Mordechai's Emcee comes off as appropriately creepy, even slimy, but gradually, as the audience is drawn into his perverse world, he becomes the life of the party - until the outside world inevitably encroaches, bringing the party to an end.

A great party it is, while it lasts: throughout Act I, Raton's audience members were treated to an extravagant entertainment from their seats around the edge of the Kit Kat Klub. Lighting, sets, costumes,

dancing, and acting all shined in a top-notch professional production. What a pleasure it is to live off the beaten path yet have shows of this quality regularly come to town. As always, the Shuler Theater is a crown jewel of the community.

The actors wore discreet microphones that were nearly invisible from most of the house, but people sitting near the front may have found them a distraction; worse, the sound up front was over-amplified and loud, though it sounded fine further back.

A larger problem was Ms. Boycott's portrayal of Sally Bowles. Perhaps the fault is attributable to director/choreographer Paula Hammons Sloan, but this Sally Bowles was over-acted, over the top, speaking and singing in her upper register, movements and expressions exaggerated and over-amped. This is a character that should attract some empathy from under

her party-girl exterior; but only near the bitter end does she even come close.

When Bowles wants to move in with American writer Cliff Bradshaw, he tells her, "This will never work: you're too distracting," to which she replies "Distracting? No, inspiring!" But Bradshaw was right, more than he knew. This performance of Bowles was a distraction.

The production was lifted by the performance of a fine eight-piece band that worked seamlessly with the

actors. The musicians were in Kit Kit Kostumes - presumably, they're on the side of the stage in many venues, but here they were unseemingly down in the Shuler's orchestra pit, except for bassist/accordionist Michael Rosengarten, who played beside audience members: not quite all of the musicians could fit in the pit. Rosengarten provided a nice visual element.

Overall, Friday night's show was grand entertainment - a jolting, exuberant dance party that gradually, inevitably, yields to the darker reality outside. At its first signs, Bowles asks,

"Politics? What does politics have to do with us?" The Emcee assures all that "There is no trouble inside," but as the final curtain falls, he's in concentration-camp stripes. No amount of drink or denial can stave off cruel reality.

Fortunately for all involved, the company's spanking-clean, huge white cast bus was parked right outside the theater's doors to take the actors farther down the road and remind the audience members that the Shuler Theater can transport them anywhere, anytime, but always drops them safely back at home.
