

# Pueblo Medal of Honor history, facts captivate Trinidad audience

Lest we forget!!

The city of Pueblo is known as America's

Congressional Medal of Honor recipient capital for having the most Medal of Honor winners, four, among a total of 3,447 recipients since the American Civil War. The

city's nationallyknown Medal of Honor Museum at the Pueblo Convention Center largely resulted from the efforts of Paulette and Jim Stuart and their MofH committee members, who first took on the project back in 1995 at the urging longtime Pueblo Chieftain publisher Bob

Rawlings. Paulette and Jim were Trinidad Holiday Inn Thursday to present Pueblo's Medal of Honor story and history to a large group of combined and enthralled Trinidad Kiwanis and Rotary Club members.

Walsenburg native Paulette Stuart just retired from the Chieftain as its promotions manager after 23 years. In addition to her role in helping create the Medal of Honor Memorial in Pueblo in 2000 and as executive director of the Pueblo Medal of H o n o r Foundation, she

also played an integral part working with the Southeastern Colorado Tourism Council to get the first Colorado Visitors Center in the state located in Trinidad in the late 1970s and early '80s.

The center was later moved to its current Nevada Avenue site and now houses military memorial plaques for thousands of World War II, Korean, Vietnam, Iraq and Afghanistan war veterans.

Paulette Stuart outlined patriotic upbringing by her dad and how she came involved Pueblo's Medal of Honor project. was always aware that there was something very important about our military and that served were doing so were very special," she said. "I've had many tasks, projects and programs during my work at Pueblo the Chieftain. But none were so life altering as when my boss Mr. Rawlings asked if I could involved in the Medal of Honor

project." The initial projects in 1995 focused on just bringing Pueblo's four Medal of Honor recipients back to town for various ceremonies. said Stuart Rawlings then got the idea for

RATON - Raton City Commissioners met Wednesday evening for a budget workshop to tackle

an expected \$300,000 budget shortfall. Paul Cassidy with RBC Capital Marketing was on hand to go over some historical data for the commis-

sion to consider when they prepare the upcoming budget. The State of New Mexico requires the city to maintain at least a 1/12 reserve for emergency funding Cassidy noted. He also went over some of the historical data that is used for bond ratings and loan analysis for debt service and loan capacity as well as bonding capacity.

Commissioner Chuck Henry asked how they, RBC

arrived at some of their conclusions. Cassidy explained it wasn't the easiest thing to do since the city operates on a cash basis. The only way that many conclusions could be determined was to look at historical data. Cassidy also noted that the city is in good shape on its debt service with interest rates on its loans at less than 5 percent. Cassidy also suggested that unless the city is going after other loans that they do not need to look at refinancing.

Cassidy noted that the transfer station is going to be one of the big things the city will have to consider and Cassidy suggested commissioners really consider raising sanitation rates since that department is operating at a loss. The city will probably need to take a debt of close to \$3 million over a 20-year period Continued on page 3

# Capulin restaurant faces high

CAPULIN - The popular summer restaurant at Capulin Country Store will not open Sunday for its traditional Mother's Day buffet and is unlikely to open this year. Coverage by The Chronicle-News in Monday's and Tuesday's editions has brought a flurry of activity and a window of hope, but the hurdles remain high. The property lacks sufficient space to install a required septic system upgrade.

Carlos Romero, Environmental Health Division Director of the New Mexico Environment Department (NMED), provided clarifications and details in a phone interview from his Santa Fe office Wednesday.

"All of the regulations involved here are those of NMED," Romero clarified. "None of this has anything to do with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) or the federal government in any way.'

The restaurant's current NMED Food Establishment Permit, issued June 30, 2009, was
