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County Administrator Cordova helps bring the grants

Administrator Bill Cordova has secured well over \$30 million in grants for both the City Trinidad and Las Animas County in his years with the County. Recently, he has gone out and worked

hard to get the



county \$130,000 for rural fire districts to be able to acquire 64 800MHz hand held radios for fire response. To date, Cordova has helped out Trinidad and Las Animas County first responders with over \$2 million in grant funds from Home Land Security.

Of the \$130,000, about \$122,000 will go toward buying the radios and the rest of the money will go to buying programming.

Cordova played an integral role in \$2.5 millions of those dollars going to build three 800 MHz communication towers in the county.

Each of the 800MHz radios cost \$1,800; the 2500 Model in the past cost \$3,800.

The Federal Communications Commission is now requiring all first response entities to comply and change over from UHF and VHF communications to 800 MHz communications by January of 2013. It will cost about \$5 million

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Nursing home bill passes House, heads to Senate

The Chronicle-News On Monday a bill to stop the sale of the Trinidad State Nursing Home House Bill 10-1217, sponsored by Rep. Wes McKinley, passed the third reading by a 47-16 vote and now the bill heads to the

Senate. House Bill 10-1217 was co-sponsored by Rep. Buffie McFadyen Pueblo; Rep. Ed Vigil, San Luis; Rep. Sal Pace, Pueblo; and Marsha Looper, Colorado Springs. The bill was introduced back in early February.

The bill basically blocks The Colorado Department of Human Services (DOHS) from selling the Trinidad State Nursing Home.

Last week local veterans, and Animas Commissioners went to Denver to talk to members of the Colorado House of Representatives to help pass HB 10-1217 to keep the nursing home for now a state-owned facility before the first reading of
