

TSJC's Career Fair/Spring Fest: Looking into Your Future was held April 14 on the TSJC Trinidad campus. More than 190 high school students from 11 area high schools participated with 86 high seniors receiving the Red Carpet Scholarship.

Students attending came from Aguilar, Crowley County, Hoehne, Holy Trinity Academy, La Veta, Los Lunas, Primero, Raton, Springer, Trinidad and Valencia.

Home Free brings a cappella joy to the Shuler

When the nationallytouring Minnesota a cappella group Home Free took the Shuler stage Thursday night and jumped into their opening notes, the first thought was, "They're playing recorded bass and drum tracks...that's cheating!"

and cymbal parts in an unaccompanied drum solo was it possible to grasp the enormity of what he's accomplished. It turns out he's twice won first place vocal percussionist titles at National Harmony Sweepstakes competitions.

Rupp's percussion anchored and propelled Home Free's richly-layered They've worked out many comedy bits and jokes, but they clearly enjoyed improvising and playing around, too. It worked: the audience laughed as often it applaud-

The five singers wore matching dark charcoal suit coats and slacks with black speakers and white laces, each wearing his choice of t-shirt. Four slender singers included Foust, whose speaking and singing voice was an impossibly low and deep bass; the highest voice belonged to tenor Rob Lundquist, the one singer who was, well, large. The group allowed the personality of each singer to emerge as all made enjoyable connections with the audience. Highlights included a barbershop quartet-style "I Am Woman" and The Beatles' "I Saw Her Standing There," for which the singers lined up across the stage to pantomime The Beatles with their instruments, right down to Ringo Starr's drum kit and Paul McCartney playing lefthanded bass. When Jason Mraz' contemporary hit "I'm Yours" reached its first hook, squeals of delight escaped from an entourage of teens in the upper balcony. The least effective song was the band's official closer, "God Bless the U.S.A.," which seemed a gratuitous choice, yet one guaranteed to strengthen the calls for an encore. Using cordless microphones, four of the five singers fanned out across the auditorium, even up into the balcony, to fan the revelry with "Joy to the World," and it would be fair to say that they brought down the house. With just one show remaining in the Raton Arts & Humanities Council's 2009-2010 Performing Arts Season, the council began Thursday night selling season tickets to the 2010-2011 series at a discount price of just \$75 until June. Home Free's laugh-filled a cappella singing show reminded patrons of just what a great deal that is.

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But it wasn't so.

The band's secret weapons, taking it far above expectations, were "bassist' Tim Foust and "percussionist" Adam Rupp: while both contributed some harmony vocals, mostly they provided what sounded convincingly like a professional rhythm section, produced entirely with their mouths. It was extraordinary.

In fact, only when Rupp actually sat at an imaginary drum kit and used his

vocal harmony sounds as they performed two full sets of familiar songs and a pair of originals. Just reading the song list was enough to provoke laughter - the group sings the surf instrumental classic "Wipeout" and comedy is, indeed, an integral part of the group's attraction.

They've figured out that the key to the audience having fun is for the singers themselves to have fun.
