Commissioners meet with nursing home residents

Las Animas County officials, local residents, and administrators all agree that taking care of the residents and keeping the 50-plusyear-old Trinidad State Nursing Home open are the two main priorities, along with passing a one cent sales tax this November.

"The residents should be our main concern," said Commission Chairman Jim Montoya. "There is no way that any governor will close this home. It would be political suicide," Montoya told nursing home staff and residents at the Monday morning meeting. "Even when my term ends at the end of this year, I will still continue the fight for the residents of this home. If they try to close it I will be one of the first ones to head up to the state capitol to protest."

Two weeks ago Rep. Ed Vigil and Rep. Sal Pace asked and received more than \$400,000 from the Joint Budget Committee (JBC) to keep the home financially stable until April of 2011. This money was taken from the state's general fund.

There is still a cloud and a reported date of Nov. 10, 2010 that Vikki Manley and the Colorado Department of Human Services (DOHS) has set to sell the home in hopes of beating a new governor into office who then might keep the TSNH a state facility.

Both Commission Chairman Montoya and Commissioner Jim Vigil, who were at the meeting, both agree that the home cannot close but have different ideas that were made clear during the meeting. Montoya would like to see the county or a local non-profit run the home and Vigil thinks it would be better if a private entity takes over.

Vigil added, "It might cost the state more money to close the home than to keep it open."

The census on Monday was at 86 out at the home, with two residents in the hospital and two more that were going to be admitted by Tuesday. Four bids are still on the table, including one from a local nonprofit entity. The governor gave the county time to put a sales tax issue on the November ballot to raise funds. This does not guarantee that the county would get the home, it only puts it in the bidding process. The county will have only eight days to summit a bid to DOHS, according to its new, selfimposed deadline. The TSNH is not the only home losing money. Five other state-run long-term care facilities are losing even more money than TSNH. The consensus at Monday's meeting is that politics has played a big role in the DOHS trying to rid itself of the TSNH. "I just got our financial report for the month of August," said Lee Burkholder, the director out at the Trinidad State Nursing Home. "We made \$45,000 net income in August. That's after we paid the state \$33,000 for services. Plus, \$20,000 to support the office up there and we still made \$45,000 in August. In July of 2010 we made \$20,000. We are not an organization that is losing money. It's a political decision. So financially, we are very attractive to potential buyers. I still get calls from those who bid who want to buy the home.' Montoya added, "It is now up to the voters to decide. We need to support this one cent sales tax and put pressure on DOHS to do the right thing and keep this home open.'

Capulin Volcano Run grows by leaps and bounds

The 3rd Annual Capulin Volcano Run Around the Rim grew by leaps and bounds this year, more than tripling its half-marathon, 5 kilometer, and fun-run fields while drawing 18 entrants to the new 10-kilometer run.

Draw a line from Denver down to Santa Fe and Los Alamos, then east to Amarillo, and finally up across Oklahoma to central Kansas and back to Denver: runners came from various points within that line, 104 runners in the timed events and dozens of runners of all ages in the fun-runs.

The half-marathon drew 59 runners who sped all the way up Capulin Volcano, around the rim, back down to the base of the mountain, then continued downhill all the way to Folsom - 13.1 miles total Amarillo's Kevin McClish shaved three minutes off his winning time from last year and still lost as the race's growing reputation drew new talent.

Eric Peters of Santa Fe won the half-marathon in just one hour, twenty-seven minutes and 21 seconds (1:27.21), about six and a half minutes per mile, and several of those miles were up the side of a volcano.

The big story, though, was newly-christened Santa Fean Michelle Born: after chasing McClish all the way up the mountain, she passed him on the downhill and held him off all the way to Folsom, claiming 2nd place overall with a time of 1:33.18. It was an impressive feat for the young woman runner who earned cheers all the way up and down the route.

As the Capulin race begins to grow exponentially, it is drawing more elite runners. Born, 22, just graduated from the University of San Francisco, where she competed on the school's intercollegiate long-distance team. She moved to Santa Fe to attend UNM at Albuquerque, where she's working on her master's degree in sports marketing while working in Santa Fe for US Art Show Productions.

Peters, 41, also made a career move to Santa Fe, leaving his Kansas home 13 years ago to work as an air quality monitor for the New Mexico Environment Department. He's run in 30 marathons since 1985, including big races in Belgrade, Jamaica, and South America. In 1996, he placed 29th in the US Olympic Marathon Trials.

As the sun rose over the south shoulder of Capulin Volcano Sunday morning, Peters took the lead with his first step and he saw other runners only as he descended the mountain: no one ever challenged him.

Last year, a quartet of Trinidad women dominated the women's half-marathon, taking the top three places. This year, they all improved their times by as
