"Teddy Bear Roundup" support local law enforcement began preparing the book three years ago, revisiting, expanding, and supplementing the earlier materials. The result is what Niederman calls, "A fun book, a happy book, a celebration. Sixteen chapters are sup-

plemented with a statewide calendar of food festivals, bringing the length to 137 pages. The paperback book is available for \$27.50 from all book retailers or from New Mexico Magazine at www.nmmagazine.com or 1(800) 711-9525.

The back cover proclaims, "an armchair tour of cafes, ranches, festivals, home kitchens, and farmers markets through the eyes of veteran food-travel writer Sharon Niederman.'

Content includes green chile in Hatch and pies in Pie Town. It's not a cookbook, but each chapter includes some recipes. Niederman explores how food is grown and then prepared. She pays attention to history and utensils in a hands-on immersion with what she calls New Mexico's foodways.

Local northeastern New Mexico visits include the cakewalk at the Colfax County Fair, foraging for chokecherries along the

entire chapter spent learning to make potica bread Raton's with Betty Antonucci. "A citrus-flavored loaf, very rich but not too sweet," Niederman learns that potica has long been a treasured holiday tradition, especially in coalcamp culture. Antonucci learned the Italian version from her mother while growing up in Pueblo. The bread is made at Christmas, but it's also popular for Easter, weddings, and birthdays.The next Niederman's book-signings are Dec. 4 at Collected Works in Santa Fe, Dec. 5 at Bookworks Albuquerque, and Dec. 12 at Tome on the Range in Las

Notice to Parents of Children 8 and Younger New Guidelines for 2010 Flu Vaccination

*Children 8 yrs and younger will need 2 doses of seasonal influenza vaccine this year if they did not receive the HINI vaccine last year.

*Children 8 yrs and younger who have never before received the seasonal influenza vaccine will require 2 doses.

*Children 8 yrs and younger who received seasonal influenza vaccine for the first time last year, but who only received I dose, require 2 doses this year

*Children 8 yrs and younger who received influenza vaccine last year, but for whom it cannot be determined whether it was seasonal or HINIvaccine, 2 doses are recommended this year.
