Hospital taking tighter security measures

Staff at Mt. San Rafael Hospital is temporarily monitoring more closely who comes and goes from the hospital in order to ensure the safety of staff and patients, according to Marketing Director Kim Lucero.

Visitors will continue to check in just inside the main entrance, through which the public has to enter and leave the hospital. The public also can gain access through the emergency room. For now, Lucero said, side doors used by staff cannot be accessed by visitors. "This is just a precautionary thing," and everything at the hospital is "business as usual," Lucero added. "Things are not unsafe by any means.'

The stepped-up security measures are "very short term," Lucero of the procedures that went into effect at 10 a.m. Sunday. When asked if there was something that precipitated the increased security, Lucero declined further comment.

The Chronicle-News received a tip late Monday morning that the hospital was under a lockdown, but a visit to the hospital found nothing out of the ordinary, no lockdown and a relatively quiet and empty lobby.



back to a gentler, simpler time. At the risk of sounding too pedantic, they just don't make movies like this any more. At least, they don't make very many of them and they usually never find their way to the big screens towns like small Trinidad. There wasn't a single car chase; there was little, if any, profanity; only some mild violence; and no sex whatsoever. The recent release - Get Low - offers a filling taste of moviemaking on its most basic level with satisfying portions of the three most important ingredients – a great story,

well-written dialog and superb acting.

Get Low takes place in the 1930s and is based on a true story. It's about a hermit who lives in the scenic backwoods of Tennessee and decides to throw a "funeral party" for himself before he dies. The movie is a treat to watch and the deliberate pace plods along like a leisurely Sunday afternoon. At one point, I thought to myself, this movie is kind of slow. But I was enjoying watching the eve-pleasing scenery (filmed in Georgia) and the masterful actors running circles around one another, that I didn't even mind. The movie is driven by story and dialog, not to mention (again) the unparalleled acting. Like I said, they just don't make them like this anymore and it is such a welcome pleasure to see a film like this when it does

come along. OK a disclaimer here I would pay the admission price to watch Robert Duvall sit on a stool and read a phone book. I can practically say the same thing for Bill Murray, who also stars in the film (it's been a fun and enjoyable ride to watch his transformation from his early days on Saturday Night Live to a top-tier, serious actor). And Sissy Spacek more than holds her own along side these heavyweights. It's wonderful to see her on the big screen again. The vounger Lucas Black turns in another character actor performance that greatly contributes to the movie. I've enjoyed Black's characters in every movie I've seen him in. The venerable Gerald McRaney has a smaller, but strong role. Character actor Bill Cobbs, as a preacher, also is recognizable from the many films in which he's appeared.

Duvall plays the main character, a mysterious and cranky hermit, who wants to invite to his funeral everyone who has a story to tell about him, well aware that those stories probably won't be pleasant recollections. One of the other characters cracks that the guest list then would comprise most of the populace of several counties. enough said about the plot.



except that there are further twists and turns along the way. It's more drama than comedy, though there are some good chuckles to be had.

Get Low plays at the Fox tonight, Wednesday and Thursday at 7:30 p.m. This is a movie for anyone interested in the medium of film, or for anyone who is just curious about what a real movie can be and what it can offer the viewer. It is strong testimony to the belief that less is more.

If you don't go out to the movies anymore, that's all the more reason to get out and see this one. I guarantee you, it will again be quite some time before another movie like this one comes along. Area film buffs should not short themselves and should get out to see Get Low while they have this opportunity.

Capulin Volcano 'Run Around the Rim' set Sunday

Volcano "Run Around the Rim" races arrive at dawn Sunday as dozens of runners from throughout New Mexico and surrounding states respond to the starter's gun by running to the top of Capulin Volcano, around the volcano's rim, and back down.

Half-marathon mile) racers will continue all the way down the hill to Folsom. 10K racers will start at the volcano's base and run directly down to Folsom. There will also be a 5K (3.1-mile) race and a fun run, both of which will start and end at the Folsom School.

Pre-race registration is required

www.CapulinVolcanoRun.c om, where complete race information is available. Race fees range from \$45 for the half marathon to \$25 for the 10K, \$15 for the 5K, and \$1 for the fun run: each entry also has an Internet processing fee in the \$3-4 range. The first 50 registrants in each race are guaranteed a race t-shirt, except in the fun run, which has no shirt.

This year's halfmarathon already had 43 entrants by last week, up from last year's total field of 18. Last year's winners were Kevin McClish of Amarillo. Texas, who took the men's division in 97 minutes, and Trinidad's Michelle Hopper who took the women's crown with a time of 2:04.41.

The 10K is new this year and had 13 runners entered as of last week. The 5K had 15 entrants, and the fun run, six. All runs are expected to pick up many more entrants this week. All race winners will receive prizes. Fun run participants will receive ribbons. All half-marathon entrants will receive medals. Vital Roads is also providing goodie bags to all

participants. Food and drinks will be available after the race for all the run-

Half-marathon and 10K racers will gather Sunday morning at the Folsom School at 6 a.m. They'll be transported by bus to the Capulin Volcano Visitor Center at 6:30, then to the starting line where the sun is expected to appear just as the starter's pistol fires at 7

For the half-marathon runners, the first 4.5 miles are entirely uphill, a real test of the runners' lungs, but it's all downhill from there...and that's a real test of the runners' legs as their knees take a pounding on the steep downhill grades. The course is breathtaking in more ways than one: most runners agree that it's the most beautiful course they've ever seen. The race website proclaims, immodestly but accurately, "This course is insanely cool!"

5K and fun run partici-

pants can sleep a little later if they don't mind missing the excitement in the air as the distance runners prepare for their start. The shorter races begin at the Folsom School at 8 a.m.

Restrooms will be available at the Folsom School, Capulin Volcano Visitor Center, "and a bunch of trees along the way." Water stations and volunteer EMTs will be available at regular intervals along the race route.

For the many people coming to the area the night before the race, there will be a spaghetti dinner and late registration (without the \$3-4 Internet processing fee) at the Folsom School Saturday from 5 to 7 p.m.

All events are sponsored by the non-profit Folsom Museum, which uses the proceeds to support its many educational and entertainment programs. For information, directions, and lodging options, refer to www.CapulinVolcanoRun.com.



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
