

A change of venue this year hasn't changed the basic awards dinner-business meeting format for the 130th annual Trinidad & Las Animas County Chamber of Commerce's Annual Meeting, Chenoweth Award and Mardi Gras-themed Casino Night Saturday night at El Rancho Bar & Cafe, 1901 Santa Fe Trail.

The chamber has publicly released that late community volunteer extraordinaire Phyllis Moniot has posthumously won the Chenoweth Award among eight community nominated candidates - Pat Fletcher, Trish Keck, Haskell Hooks, Rafaelita Gonzales, Louise Terry, Ann Risley and Lori and Anita Phillips.

The chamber will announce its traditional Chamber Ambassador of the Year Award among three candidates - Steven Kelly, Carol Gibson and Deb Hartman. Also, this year will be a special recognition for the chamber's involvement in Colorado Junior Achievement.

Cocktails and hors d' oeuvres, the popular silent auction, and casino kick off the action at 5 p.m., dinner is served at 7 and the awards presentations are set for 7:30. Local comedian Denny Anderson will perform his routines and KCRT radio owner-manager Dave Phillips will provide DJ music.

Senior tickets are priced at \$25, chamber members are \$35 and corporate tables for eight are \$360. Tickets are still available at the chamber office. The chamber is expecting another crowd of around 175-200.

In a letter to membership, chamber Executive Director/CEO Kim Schultz noted that, "Although our community is experiencing some economic issues, we prove time and time again that we are the little town that can, plunging forward and making the best out of what we are given. We have seen many changes in our business community, gaining some new businesses and losing some old, but overall, we have seen progress." She pointed out the I-25 Reconstruction Project's near completion should start bringing needed dollars back to the area. "We are also seeing some new industry coming into the area with the re-opening of the New Elk Coal Mine and the re-opening of the Cuchara Mountain Resort area to shine some new light on the local economy. 'The chamber itself has been experiencing some budget shortfalls and we too have been making lemonade out of the lemons we have been given," said Schultz. "Because we have had to tighten our belts, some of our projects have been set back temporarily. But on the whole we are still able to provide those services which we have always provided." She pointed to the chamber's revamped and more comprehensive website, www.trinidadchamber.com, and the many Internet hits it has been getting, including a significant increase in the number of community tourism and relocation inquiries. The chamber plans to intro-duce a 130th Trinidad anniversary edition this summer and continues to work on community partnerships and Trinidad State Junior College to implement its John Building's Community Development Resource Center. Last week, Schultz also traveled to the Colorado Legislature as part of the Southern Colorado Action 22 board contingent to lobby on behalf of regional issues, including the pending state budget closure of the Fort Lyon Correctional Facility in Bent County. "We were also there to meet new state cabinet members, our new Legislators and department heads and we heard Gov. John Hickenlooper and Lt. Gov. Joe Garcia speak on the state budget. They're expecting 800 new bills to be introduced in the Legislature this year." Brazil exchange students winter in Raton

Just as winter's bitter cold reached Raton in mid-December, three young engineering students arrived from their homes in Brazil to spend their summer vacations exploring the United States. Ilana Mota de Almeida, Angela Rossetto Rathier, and Ithiara Dalponte are in the midst of a three-month stay in Raton, after which they'll spend another month traveling the U.S. from coast to coast before returning for a final year of studies to complete their engineering degrees at universities in their home country of Brazil, which is currently enjoying the peak of summer.

Cultural Homestay International (CHI) is a non-profit educational exchange program serving citizens of the U.S. and more than 30 other countries. Americans can spend months overseas in such programs as Overseas English Tutor, in which they tutor their host families in English for several hours each week, while foreign students can experience America through programs such as the USA Work & Travel Program (www.chinet.org).

Through CHI, the Brazilian

students acquired a U.S. J-1 Visa to allow them four months of work and travel in the U.S. before they're required to return to their home country. CHI found them both lodging and work as winter seasonal employees at the Best Western Raton Hotel, where they work both in housekeeping and the hotel's restaurant, Mulligan's.

All three women knew others who have taken advantage of the program, staying in such American locales as Miami, New York City, Buffalo, Baton Rouge, Louisville, Lake Tahoe, and Taos. They were surprised to draw a




Ilana Almeida arrived first, traveling alone from her home in Bahia, in northeast Brazil. She flew to Miami, then Dallas, then Albuquerque, where she boarded the Amtrak train northward to Raton. She stepped off the train at dusk on Dec. 10. With no idea of how to get to the Raton Hotel, she asked a man on the street, "Where can I get a bus?" then "Where can I get a taxicab?" Of course, neither is available in Raton. The man gave her a ride.

Angela Rathier and Ithiara Dalponte are college friends and study partners from a national university in Curitiba in the state of Parana, population 2 million, in the south of Brazil and 1,000 miles from Ilana Almeida's home. The pair flew together to Atlanta, then to Denver, where they boarded a Greyhound bus southward to Raton. They stepped off at the bus stop behind McDonald's at 5 a.m. on Dec. 19. Having left summer behind, they walked across the Clayton Highway to the Raton Hotel in the predawn darkness, stepping in the first snow either had seen in her life.

This is a peak season for the hotel with skiers and other winter travelers. The gals work cleaning rooms, then pitch in at the restaurant as both waitresses and dishwashers. Angela and Ithiara share a room next to Ilana's. They use the microwave ovens in their rooms to cook noodles or pre-prepared foods, or they can use their employee discounts to eat in the restau-

friends, quick to laugh over many shared tales. Angela says she and Ithiara were late in applying for the program and assignments are first-come, first-served. "The big cities go fast, and the ski resorts. We could list five choices." Ilana adds, "I got a call in November offering me a stay in a place called Raton, New Mexico. It was so close now to my vacation that I was afraid I would not get placed. I said yes.

The women, all born in 1989, have no car in Raton. They walk. "Every time we walk to Super Save, there is no sidewalk so we walk on the street. Everyone stares at us like we're homeless people!"

Ilana says, "It can get boring because there's nothing to do." So, Angela says, "We eat!" They walk to their favorite Raton restaurants – Pizza Hut, Sonic, McDonald's, and Subway. These are favorites because they're familiar: all four are commonly found in the women's Brazilian hometowns.

"We miss Brazilian food so much!" Angela says. "I like Mexican food, but it's too spicy for me.'

Three times they've gotten their friend Carlos, from the restaurant kitchen, to give them a ride to the Raton airport where they've rented a car for an adventure. They drove to Santa Fe and back: "We needed clothes!" Ithiara says. She's the one with an international driver's license, so she's their driver. Santa Fe was engulfed in a snowstorm. "We passed lots of cars that were upside down!" she says. "When I told my father that I drove in the snow, he got mad at me!" Their big splurge was to drive a rental car all the wav to Las Vegas, Nev., where they stayed in a big hotel...and ate at a Brazilian restaurant. It was Ithiara's 22nd birthday. Beside the stares they get walking around Raton, two topics especially bring out their laughter. One is

deer, the other a ski trip. "We saw some deer right here at the hotel!" Ithiara exults. They're sorry that the town's many bears are hibernating: they'd love to see one. Co-workers have told them of a time, long ago, when a bear was found in a tree in the hotel's inner courtyard. "We don't have deer or bears in Brazil,' Ithiara says.

They get downright giddy telling of their ski trip to Angel Fire. "It was really hard!" Angela says. "It was really good!" Ilana and Ithiara respond. They laugh as they share stories of their first ski runs, something they'll tell everyone about when they get home.

All three will leave Raton March 15. Ilana will go straight to New York City where she'll spend six days with her grandmother, aunt, and cousin. "I'm dreaming about it." She's so excited that she's literally counting the days.

Ithiara and Angela will travel together to Los Angeles where they anticipate six days touring Hollywood, Beverly Hills, Venice Beach, and Malibu. They fancy renting a car for a quick trip up Highway 1 to San Francisco and back. Then they, too, will fly to New York City, for five days of sightseeing. They'll spend 2-3 days enjoying Miami Beach before their return flight home.

All three women will graduate from their universities in July of 2012 -Ithiara and Angela with degrees in chemical engineering, Ilana in industrial engineering. Though they hope to travel again internationally, they expect to build their careers in

Garrison Commander Col. Robert McLaughlin. 
