# **Celtic Fire sells out Shuler Theater**

On the eve of St. Patrick's Day last Wednesday night, a polished troupe of musicians and dancers from as far away as Dublin took the Shuler stage before an exuberant sold-out crowd.

Twelve talented performers presented an elaborate production they called "Celtic Fire!" combining elements of Celtic music with generous classical overtones, supplementing the mix with a pair of highenergy dancers just off the plane from Ireland.

The core group was a Colorado-based Celtic band called Feast, led by Kathryn and Tyme Mientka of Grand Junction. They and the half-dozen performers added for a five-date St. Patrick's tour of New Mexico and southern Colorado all had extensive experience performing in the British Isles and Europe.

Their joy in playing the music was apparent, no doubt bolstered by opening the tour to a packed house in a beautiful theater. Tyme Mientka was an endearing host with his slightly shy and unpolished commentaries between songs, a nice counterpoint to the sometimes overly-polished stage production.

aka Dr. Arendt of the CU Boulder music faculty, stood out for his easy virtuosity and the sheer delight he brought to his playing. His tour de force gypsyinfluenced medley was all over the map and all over the stage as he playfully invited duets with the piano, the harp, and one of two violas. Accompanied by the whole band, his many tempo changes and humorous accents typified the approach of others, too, throughout the two-set concert.

Another standout was drummer David Alderdice, whose understated New Orleans-influenced funk was augmented by a Zenlike "cool" with his long red beard, turban-wrapped head, and placement in red lights on a riser above the rest of the action. An acapella duet with his percussionist girlfriend was a crowd favorite, combining rapid-fire nonsense syllables with minimal handclaps for a rousingly enjoyable performance.

Soprano Rebecca Arendt took center stage to sing "Danny Boy" and other Irish songs, her beautiful voice overcoming a somewhat stiff appearance. She warmed up when joined by her violinist husband, whose gleeful playing could coax a smile from a Buddha.

The Irish dancers - athletic Mark Morrison and spritely Tanya Baird -- flew in from Dublin just in time for the Raton show, having rehearsed to video of a Celtic Fire performance. Though the musicians had barely met them, the energetic dancers fit in seamlessly; in fact, part of the night's joy level came from the musicians themselves watching the dancers perform for the first time.

The production travels with two sound engineers, two lighting technicians, a stage manager and a stagehand. The sound was outstanding but the lights were unnatural washes of saturated colors that flooded the stage and the front rows of the audience – sometimes orange, sometimes green (of course), sometimes a mix of pink with blue. Only the red light added rather than subtracted.

The musicians all relied on sheet music on music stands, perhaps inevitable when gathering busy professionals from scattered locations for such a short tour. In most cases the use of sheet music was not distracting, although the harpist's music stand blocked much of the audience's view of her and her playing. She played from the sheet music even for her rendition solo of O'Carolan's "Shebeg aug

Shemor," a perennial standard in the Irish harp repertoire.

Songs and their titles were seldom introduced, so the audience often lacked context that might have added to their appreciation. The performers' names were mentioned only fleetingly or, in some cases, not at all. No program was provided.

As the crowd inched up the aisles after the show, it was clear that they'd loved the show, but one laggard who looked suspiciously Irish himself – was overheard saying, "It's not quite what I expected. Too much contemporization." It was indeed a big, sometimes circus-like production of Celtic-influenced music, perhaps lacking the soulwrenching intimacy some had hoped to hear.

It's hard to argue with a though. full house, Producer Bill Fegan says he had to turn many people away: even at \$29, every seat in the house was sold. A man wearing a kilt lamented the band's lack of bagpipes but said he was willing to settle for the harp. His smiles and laughter showed that he, like the others milling in the lobby to greet the performers after the show, had had a big night of great entertainment.
