Construction is underway across from Cimino Park on the east corner of the Trinidad Catholic football field on a new veterans memorial that will honor all local veterans from all wars. The project is set for completion early this summer.

Local engineer Bob Just helped get this project off the ground. On Monday afternoon Just showed Trinidad Mayor Jennie Garduno and Las Animas County Commissioner Mack Louden the new site. "It is an honor to be part of this project," Just said.

The project started on April 12, and the granite is on order from Trinidad Monument

Part of the funding is coming from the city's capitol improvements fund and the city was reimbursed some monies from the Colorado Department of Transportation, that had taken out the old veterans memorial down on Pine and Commercial Street as part of the new I-25 highway project. 

Dry Cimarron Tour Saturday


FOLSOM, N.M. – You know it's spring when the annual Dry Cimarron Tour arrives. Saturday morning a caravan of trucks and cars will gather at the Folsom Museum at 8 a.m. to take this year's trek through the history, archaeology, geology, and beauty along the Dry Cimarron River Valley from Folsom to Kenton, Okla.

Most years there are a couple dozen people of all ages along for the ride, coming from a radius of 60 miles. This year, though, promises to be bigger as the May issue of New Mexico Magazine features a six-page spread on the Brown Ranch and its Dry Cimarron environs. There's a sidebar with details of Saturday's tour. Already, local lodges have reservations from coming people from Albuquerque and other distant locales.

Sponsored by the Folsom Museum, the tour begins with a guided street tour by longtime resident Vinita Brown of what the village of Folsom once was, before the devastating 1908

Participants will have time to enjoy free coffee while touring the museum, then join the caravan, or a carpool, to travel north and east along Highway 456 all the way to Kenton, home of the Robbers' Roost hideout of the infamous Cole Gang.

They'll visit Folsom Falls

Ranch where Fred Balmer will give some history and up-close contact with his longhorn cattle. The tour will stop at the valley's abandoned first settlement site and travel Toll Gate Canyon before stopping for an hour-long visit with Darien and Brian Brown, who will give a guided tour of their ranch headquarters, featured in the magazine article. They're likely to show the traps Ernest Thompson Seton used nearby to capture the famed wolf Lobo: Seton left the traps and they're still there.

The tour continues east across the famed Cross L Ranch to meet Boyd Burchard, who will give a history of the Prairie Cattle Company and lead a short walk to petroglyphs and Indian sites on his ranch. Folsom Falls Ranch will bring a cowboy lunch for all to enjoy under the trees.

Sixteen miles of dirt road pass fascinating geological sites and dramatic buttes with names Wedding Cake and Battleship before crossing the state line to arrive at Kenton in the late afternoon.

The Dry Cimarron Valley Tour is open to all at no charge, although the Folsom Museum appreciates donations for the tour and the lunch. Local trooper back on the road

A Colorado state trooper from Las Animas County charged in a New Year's Eve fight in a nightclub in Greeley, is back on duty for

Jorge Leal, 32, of Trinidad, was charged with assault and had been put on paid administrative leave while the patrol investigated his alleged involvement at the Cactus Canyon Bar/Nightclub.

Leal was formally charged with third-degree assault. Officials from the state patrol said Leal was placed on administrative leave

after the CSP made was aware of charges against him stemming from the New Year's fight. He is part of the Colorado State Patrol team Trinidad. CSP The



did conduct an internal investigation that zeroed in on any potential violations of the CSP code of conduct, polices or general order by Leal.

Greeley authorities said that Leal was cooperative at the scene.

Two other suspects, according to the police report, tried to flee on foot across the parking lot of the Cactus Canyon nightclub, but were caught by police. Reports state that two nightclub workers were injured and one was taken by ambulance to the Northern Colorado Medical Center.

Leal and three others were charged in the incident.

There has been no word whether the CSP's own internal investigation determined that Leal had violated its policies or orders.

The case against Leal is proceeding in Greeley Municipal Court, according to the district attorney's office in Weld County. If Leal is found guilty in this case, the CSP could conduct another investigation into the matter. When asked about the case, and Leal's next court date, Weld County officials did not return The Chronicle-News' phone calls.
