Olympiaganza stirs up the gods

The gods were angry, confused, and conniving as Raton High School's Mask & Wig Club presented Don Zolidis's one-act come-"The Greek Mythology Olympiaganza," at the Shuler Theater over the weekend.

The growing drama club put 15 young actors onstage, with most playing multiple roles. Six additional students worked behind the scenes as technical crew. Club sponsor Cian Hazen took his second turn at directing after a long apprenticeship with Gail Dixon-Willden.

If the play provided less rolling laughter than last year's "The **Brothers** Grimm Spectaculathon," it's partly because Zolidis's kaleidoscope of Brothers Grimm characters is more familiar than the many gods goddesses of Olympiaganza. These characters from Greek mythology are household names, but that's as much as

most people know of them.

Theatre under Dixon-Willden's direction, was also a far more elaborate effort, with sets and costumes being built during a rehearsal period two to three times longer than the quicklyassembled Olympiaganza, which assembled an entertainment in just under four weeks.

Working within those limitations, it fell to the young actors to deliver the comedy, and they had fun living up to the challenge. Zolidis specializes in writing plays for high school students, his Continued on page 2

Trinidad man arrested after dragging death in Texas

A Trinidad man was arrested and charged with murder on Friday morning in Texas, along with two other men, for their alleged part in the dragging death of a 24-year-old Hill County, Texas,

Raymond Scott Harrington, 32. of Trinidad, his brother Raymond George Harrington, 23, of Grandbury, Texas, and the victim's brother, Marcus Allen Beckham, 25, of Milford, Texas, were all arrested at the residence of Marcus Allen Beckham Friday morning.

The body of Beckhams's brother, Christopher Neal Beckham, was found around 8 a.m. Thursday morning by a group of high school kids who were on a weather related delay for school, according to police. The students reportedly were hunting for coyotes when they found the body of Christopher Beckham near a field along HCR (Hill County Road) 3425 and FM (Farm Market) 308. The road is between Malone and Irene in rural Hill County.

Earthquake hits Cokedale Sunday morning

Cokedale residents who may have felt shaking in their slumber early Sunday morning were not merely imagining it. A magnitude 3.7 earthquake was reported in Cokedale at 4:44 a.m., according to the U.S. Geological Survey website. The quake's depth reached 5 kilometers, or about 3.1 miles, according to the USGS. No damages were reported in the early morning rumbler.

The Sangre de Cristo Fault was the base from which this tremor originated, according to the USGS. This particular fault runs more than 110 miles from the New Mexico border north into Colorado.

There are more than 100 potentially active faults in Colorado, and 400 tremblers of at least 2.5 magnitude have occurred in Colorado since the late 1800s, according to the USGS. Back in 2001, 12 quakes reportedly shook the Trinidad and Northern New Mexico area, between Aug. 28 and Sept. 21. These earthquakes regis-Continued on page 2

Ila Raine Medina and Toby Henson served as narrators, providing the audience less with context than with comedy. Medina's hot pink-and-black early-1970s go-go girl costume was fabulous; Henson repeatedly showed a talent for finding a laugh in a single word as he squeezed it into a grin. In comedy, many words sitting on the page will not, by themselves, produce a laugh: they depend on capable delivery by an actor with good comic skills: Henson already has that.

Marcus Hodge won laughs playing an actor upset with having to play a character named Uranus, pronouncing the word repeatedly to giggling vulgar effect.

Chris Fissel and Emily Berry played an extended scene as Chronos and his wife Rhea, who's upset because Chronos keeps eating their children. He's been told that one of his children will grow up to kill him, so he's come up with this solution. Haley James plays a marriage counselor who provides the couple

much-needed therapy, but it's not enough. Rhea has secretly managed to raise one of the couple's children to adulthood.

No sooner does Chronos learn this than his son Zeus, played by a Goth James Neary, arrives to chase him off the stage.

Neary has a lot of stage time, both as Zeus and as Orpheus, who haggles with Hades, played by Lucas

tered between 2.8 and 4.6.

Earthquakes in Colorado are common. according to a spokesperson from the U.S. Geological Survey. Nine quakes have been reported so far in 2011 and more than 100 have been recorded over the past four years. Faults in Colorado are capable of producing earthquakes of 7.0 or greater, according to the USGS.

According to a Hill County Sheriff's spokesman, the quartet were drinking Wednesday night, Feb. 9, at a Hill County Texas bar, when they were thrown out because Christopher Beckham allegedly became confrontational and belligerent. Following this, all four ended up along the side of FM 308. An affidavit

states that a fight started and Christopher Beckham ended up in an unconscious state. The report also states that a strap was then allegedly tied around the neck of Christopher Beckham and attached to the ball-hitch of a 2003 Dodge Ram truck owned by Raymond Harrington, of Trinidad. Christopher Beckham's body was apparently dragged for about five

minutes According to an affidavit that was released on Friday, Christopher Beckham was found in only a t-shirt, jeans and cowboys boots, with abrasions to his face, cuts to his forehead and hands, and a scratch on his right side.

According to the report, Marcus Beckham told authorities that after his brother was dragged, the suspects then made an attempt to administer first aid, but Christopher Beckham was already dead. Authorities are still investigating the death and interviewing the suspects. A warrant was issued for a search of the victim's brother's residence and for the pickup owned by Scott Harrington.

The body of the victim was sent to the Southwest Institute of Forensic Sciences in Dallas for an autopsy.

All three suspects were arraigned on Friday morning in a Texas courtroom and are being held on a \$1 million bond, in the Hill County jail.
