## Time to meet the candidates

Pat Fletcher: City Council candidate

After sitting back and observing the city council for a number of years and getting tired of complaining about things that happen or do not happen in Trinidad, Pat Fletcher decided to run for a city council seat in the upcoming November elections.

Fletcher is one of the eight candidates seeking a council seat and is running on the slogan: "Fletcher – For Our Community, For Our Future, For You."

Fletcher's main goals include making Trinidad a destination unto itself, rather than a pass-through city, attracting venture capitalists to revive and revitalize Trinidad and bringing new businesses to the city, in turn creating

"I've been here for a lot of years, and you can only sit back so long and say, "They should have done this,' and 'They should have done that,' and 'What were they thinking?" said Fletcher. "And maybe there's a point where you gotta

say, 'You know, if you can do bet-

ter, step up to the plate and try it.' Noting some of the challenges of the community, Fletcher said the city would have to make some serious cuts as it prepares next year's budget, but she believes the economy as a whole, locally and nationwide, would change for the better next year.

Fletcher said the community is at a critical point right now, yet she has some "good ideas, kind of way outside the box" on how to improve the city's current concerns. In regard to economic development, she wondered whether the Chamber of Commerce and the Trinidad-Las Animas County Economic Development Board should partner to come up with different packages that would help the city.

Fletcher also believes that the downtown needs to be saved and money needs to be invested in the crumbling buildings to preserve the historical value, and the city should capitalize on what it already has.

We've got so much to offer, we've got so many ways to sell ourselves, and we've never really bit the bullet and said, 'Let's go with this. Let's do it," said Fletcher adding that the city needs to be more proactive.

Regarding the turmoil in the city manager's office over the last year, Fletcher said the council should act as the city's home-rule charter says it must in terms of micromanaging the city manager.


"Per our charter, it's hands off. Basically, city council hires and fires, and they can make recommendations and ask for things....

Terry sat down Monday at the store to talk about why he decided to run and what he hoped to accomplish as a school board member. He said the recent decline in the district's enrollment and the loss of many veteran teachers were two key reasons why he decided to run.

'My goal is to make Trinidad School District #1 the first choice of parents as to where to educate their kids," Terry said. "I think we have to get the kids back in their proper schools, and I think we have to give the classrooms back to the teachers and let them teach in the way they went to school to learn to teach.

Terry said he wasn't pleased by the current board's recent decision to transfer kindergarten through second-grade students to

Fisher's Peak Elementary School. "I don't think Fisher's Peak was built to house that many kids," he

said. "I don't think it's a good idea

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## Acclaimed young pianist coming to Raton's Shuler Theater

RATON – The New York Times praised his "jaw-dropping technique and virtuosity meshed with a distinctive musicality." The Washington Post declared him "among the most gifted musicians of his generation." Just 25 years old, with a list of honors that could fill this page, acclaimed pianist Charlie Albright brings a solo concert to the Shuler Theater Thursday night, the first of six shows in this season's annual Raton Arts & Humanities Council performance

Raised in Centralia, Washington, by his Korean mother and American father, Albright began plaving piano at the age of three. A year later, he was playing piano on local and national television, although he didn't begin formal classical music training until the age of seven. He made his orchestral debut with the University of Puget Sound Symphony while still an el-


ementary school student. The music, however, didn't interfere with his education. After earning his bachelor's degree from Harvard and master's degree from New England Conservatory, Albright is currently enrolled in Julliard School of Music's doctor-

al-level Artist Diploma program. Throughout his studies, Albright has kept a busy concert schedule that has taken him all over the world. He's performed as the featured soloist with the Boston Pops and many other orchestras, and he is scheduled to tour as a soloist with the BBC Concert Orchestra in 2015. Albright has won prestigious piano competitions throughout the world, and his concert schedule has included five collaborations with famed cel-

list Yo-Yo Ma. Thursday night's 7:00 p.m. Charlie Albright concert at the Shuler leads off a series of six shows sponsored by Raton Arts & Humanities Council (RAHC), with financial support from the National Endowment for the Arts, New Mexico Arts, New Mexico Tourism Department and Raton's Whited Foundation, Darden Foundation, Sloat-Prince Foundation and City of Raton's Lodgers Tax.

Upcoming shows in the series include a Nat King Cole tribute on November 11, the Native American band Goldwing Express on February 16, TAP—The Show on March 5, Canadian troubadours The Abrams Brothers on March 31 and the high-energy Everything

Fitz family band on April 11. Reserved seat tickets are \$20 for adults, \$15 for seniors and \$10 for students, with six-show season tickets available from RAHC at \$80 for adults, \$65 for seniors and \$40 for students, or \$200 for a family of two adults and two students.
