# Indoors and out - big weekend to supply thrills for all

## Adventure race tops Raton's festive Saturday

RATON - "Think your mom is tough on you? Meet our M.O.M."

That's the catchline for Master of the Mountains, a new adventure race and relay that arrives in Raton Saturday morning. Beginning at Sugarite Canyon State Park and finishing at the NRA Whittington Center's Mountain Man Rendezvous site, Master of the Mountains is a race consisting of a rugged six-mile forest run, followed by a three-mile lake paddle

and a 20-mile bike course. An optional six-station shotgun course awaits some competitors at the finish line.

Forty-one adventure racers have signed up to begin the race at 8 a.m. at the south boat ramp just across the Lake Maloya spillway. Most entrants are members of seven relay teams, and 13 contestants plan to race the entire course solo. Eleven competitors are from Raton, and nine live in Trinidad. The other 21 athletes come from relatively close locations such as Cimarron, New Mexico and Centennial, Colorado, and others hail from as far away as Albuquerque, N.M. and even Smithville, Missouri. Most visiting competitors will stay at the Holiday Inn Express in south Raton, the official lodger of the event.

Even as the bike racers speed through downtown Raton, beginning at approximately 10 a.m., they'll be just one part of the allday festivities that begin with a street fair along Main Street, between Cook and Park. Raton's bustling farmers market begins one block over on Historic First Street at 1 p.m., which is also when Raton Museum's "Museum on Main Event" presents Marcy Heller's book signing for her "Loco Dog &

The street fair has more than 25 vendors signed up, presenting a variety of crafts, handmade jewelry, food and drink and an Orbitron ride, as well as bear carving. At 7 p.m., a block-long street dance begins with music by Whiskey Creek. All of the events, including the M.O.M. adventure race, are part of Raton MainStreet's third annual Art of the Great Outdoors weekend celebration.

Raton Director of Parks and Recreation Jared Chatterley worked with several agencies and dozens of volunteers to create the new M.O.M. race. "We are really excited," he says. "Adventure racing has become a popular sport, and what better way to show off Raton and its recreational opportunities than to host our own adventure race?'

He's pleased with the size of the race field. "We have enough for a great event but not too many to create first-vear logistical challenges. We anticipate the event will grow in the years to come."

There are many choices available for good vantage points to view the race. The best is at the Lake Maloya spillway and boat ramp, where running, paddling and biking will all be visible from one location. Visitors must stop to pay a \$5-per-vehicle fee at the visitor center or the pay station at the spillway.

Bike racers can be cheered along Highway 72 from the point at which they exit the state park to downtown Raton via First Street and Cook Avenue, then to Tiger Drive via Fifth Street and then on to York Canyon Road via Gardner Road. Maps and comprehensive details are available at the race's impressive website, www.ratonmom.com.

The finish line, southwest of Raton off of Highway 555, York Canyon Road, will have tents hosted by the National Guard and by MCMC Emergency Services. State police and county sheriff's deputies will patrol the course and be available at the finish line. Spectators can watch the shooting portion of the competition before heading back into town for the

street fair and farmers market. Master of the Mountains results and awards will be presented in a ceremony and celebration at 5 p.m. along Historic First Street, where food and beverages will be available.

# Patriot Day service set for Wednesday

A solemn ceremony will be held to commemorate the lives of the nearly 3,000 people who died during the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001. Trinidad's annual Patriot Day memorial service takes place at 10 a.m. on Wednesday, September 11, at the Colorado Welcome Center, located at 309 Nevada Ave.

The service is sponsored by the local VFW Post 984 and will be attended by other groups of veterans, local fire-, police- and emergencyservices departments and local dignitaries. The public is invited to attend this free event.

County Sheriff James Casias will serve as master of ceremonies at the memorial service. The U.S. flag will flown at half-staff, and then veteran Gilbert Martinez will play "Taps" on his trumpet. Mayor Bernadette Baca Gonzalez and other local dignitaries will make some special remarks for the occasion.

Patriot Day is not a federal holiday and schools and businesses do not close. Many organizations hold a brief prayer service during business hours, and some churches hold special services. By order of

The house lights will dim and theater screens will light up this weekend in Trinidad and Raton as the Second Annual Trindiefest Independent Film Festival fires up crowds of moviegoers throughout the area. Twenty-six films will be shown at six different venues, a significant increase over last year's 14 films. Four guest speakers will speak about different as-

pects of the film industry. Trindiefest will start entertaining audiences on Thursday, September 12, and will continue through Sunday, September 15. A complete listing of the films, show times and venues is available on the website www.trindiefest.net. Filmgoers have the option to buy tickets for individual films or to buy multiple-movie packages. Tickets will also be for sale at the various venues on a cash-only ba-

TSJC is the main sponsor of Trindiefest, and films will be shown at its Berg-Little and Massari Theatres. Other venues include SCRT's Famous Performing Arts center at 131 W. Main St., the El Raton Theatre in Raton, Mullare-Murphy Funeral Home at 335 E. Main St. and Purgatoire on Elm Restaurant.

Trindiefest organizer Kirk Loudon said Friday that things were coming together very well in advance of the festival, which will
