Conviction upheld for Trinidad pool hall killer

The Colorado Court of Appeals has upheld the murder conviction of a Trinidad man convicted of stabbing another man after a pool table dispute in 2010.

The court released its decision Wednesday in the appeal of Trinity Jay Romero. He is serving a 40-year sentence for second-degree murder for the 2010 death of Kyle Phillips. Phillips and Romero got into an argument over whether a table at the Empty Pocket Saloon was empty.

the pool hall. Romero unsuccessfully argued it

Romero's appeal involved a juror he says

Romero stabbed Phillips in the chest outside

should have been dismissed. He also argued that the jury should have gotten different guidance on self-defense claims.

The Court of Appeals rejected Romero's claims and upheld his conviction. Phillips, 24 at the time, died in a Trinidad

According to records, the two men were both at the Empty Pocket Saloon. Phillips was shooting pool with some friends, when Romero showed up with his brother and some friends of his own. According to witnesses Romero was

giving Phillips a hard time. They say Phillips ignored Romero and eventually left the bar to smoke a cigarette.

Peaceful Herbs owners hope to offer customers and community more than pot

"Ohh, it smells like pot in here." I love it when they say that," says Sona Manhani, who with her husband Dave Girdmar opened Peaceful Herbs in downtown Trinidad. Manhani bustles from the front door back to main part of the building that is dominated by the 100-year-old back-bar that formerly served booze at Monte Cristo bar and is now used to serve marijuana. The fact that it smells like pot isn't surprising. but what Manhani later says describing the customer's that have come to Peaceful Herbs

"Generally, I'd say most of the people that have come in are in their 60s-70s. And mostly it's been women. And there's been a lot of people from out of town" says Manhani.

The draw of out-of-towners is expected and as of now Peaceful Herbs is the closest marijuana dispensary to our southerly neighbors, but it's doubtful anyone expected those out-oftowners to be generally older women.

"I think, so far, our customers have been interested mostly in pain management. It hasn't been the smokeables, though we've sold quite a bit of that aswell, so much as the sprays and roll-ons. A lot have really been interested in the effective edibles we stock as well." said Manhani.

The fact that Peaceful Herb might not be what someone expects from a marijuana dispensary is just fine with owner Dave Girdmar. 'We really want to be something different,'

State Forestry awards \$6,000 for tree planting in Raton

SANTA FE, NM - The New Mexico State Forestry Division's Forest Re-Leaf Program awarded \$6,000 in grant funding to plant trees in Raton as part of the third phase of the city's downtown urban forestry project, according to the Division's Urban and Commu-

nity Forester Jennifer Dann. The City of Raton has been actively working on revitalizing their historic downtown. They recognize that trees can aid in economic development by attracting new business as well as creating a customer friendly experience,' said Dann. "We're pleased to be working with city officials and economic development groups like GrowRaton, who understand the important role trees play in the overall health of New Mexico communities."

The Raton Urban Forestry Project will include planting 14 trees and 36 shrubs along the sidewalks in the downtown area, adding to previous plantings that were funded through Re-Leaf grants in 2012 and 2013. The plantings will transform the sidewalk in front of nine historic storefronts on the west side of First Street between Rio Grande and Cook Avenues.

Awards for up to \$6,000 per community were made to projects in five communities across New Mexico. These funds, administered by New Mexico State Forestry, support valuable community tree planting efforts aimed at improving the environment, educating citizens, and beautifying public places. This year's grant recipients include the communities of Corona, Farmington, Raton, Rio Rancho and Taos. The statewide grant total for 2014 is \$20,587.

New Mexico Forest Re-Leaf was established in 1990 to provide a tree-planting grant program for public entities such as public schools, cities, towns, counties, soil and water conservation districts, rural fire districts and oth-
