Council approves retail marijuana with 6-1 vote

The use, sale and production of retail marijuana will soon be legal in Trinidad, after the City Council passed a resolution legalizing the drug after a public hearing on the issue at Thursday's Special Meeting of Council. Council voted 6 to 1 in favor of the retail-pot ordinance, with Councilmember Joe Bonato being the sole dissenting vote.

The City's moratorium on marijuana sales, either retail or medical, will end on June 30. Unlike the public hearing on legalizing

medical marijuana back in March of this year, Thursday's hearing lacked the passion and drama from advocates either favoring or opposing the legalization of pot.

Only one person voiced her opinion on the issue at the public hearing. Gloria Ahern runs the "Curves for Women" business at 413 N. Commercial St. and said she was opposed to retail pot for business reasons.

Ahern said that two marijuanarelated businesses were planned to open for business very near to her business. She said that area had very limited parking as it is, and

adding pot shops to the neighborhood would only make the parking problem worse. She said she was also concerned about safety issues.

"One of my concerns is for the safety of the ladies who come to my place," Ahern said, "Sixtyseven percent of our ladies are 60 years old and older. I would not want to compromise their safety by the activities that are going on in the neighborhood. I do realize that each of these businesses has to have security, but that's security for their businesses. It doesn't guarantee security for businesses that are half a block away, or one or two blocks away. I'm not aware that we have the police force that can police all of that stuff down there, so that's one issue."

She also said that Curves International, the franchising company she works with, would not be very happy to have one of its franchises in the same neighborhood as pot shops. She said that situation could force her to move her business to another area of the City. leaving one more empty building in the downtown area.

Ahern said she was concerned about the amount of water the marijuana growing facilities would use and asked if Council was aware of that potential prob-

Mayor Joe Reorda said Council and City staff were well aware of the water issue. Then Reorda asked Councilmembers to present a more-unified front when speaking to their fellow citizens about issues that come before the Council. He said that when Council voted to approve a measure, it did so by a majority vote and, in this country, the majority rules. He said Councilmembers with dissenting opinions on Council decisions should keep those dissenting opinions to themselves, instead of declaring them publicly. He said Councilmembers questioned about Council decisions by members of the public should simply respond by saying, "the majority rules," and leave it at that.

Joe Bonato didn't want to hear that. He said he bore no ill will against those in favor of legalized pot, but said he strongly disagreed. He said he didn't want his opinions on issues that came before Council to be stifled by the mayor or anyone else.

'Raton's Rockin' Wings & Wheels' takes off Wednesday

RATON – "Raton's Rockin' Wings & Wheels" will land at Raton Municipal Airport on Wednesday and will feature enough attractions to justify taking a summer day off from work. The family event will begin at the Raton Museum at 10:30 a.m. and ends almost 12 hours later when the Raton Osos and Trinidad Triggers finish their baseball game at Gabriele Field. The highlights, though, run all afternoon at the airport, located southwest of town on Highway 64.

The event's title includes the three highlights: "Wheels" represents a big car show; "Wings" represents airplane fly-ins and displays; and "Rockin" represents a 5 p.m. concert by The Fireballs, still rocking 55 years after forming at Raton High School in January 1959. After a string of national hits with guitar instrumentals that presaged "surf music," The Fireballs hit it big when they added singer Jimmy Gilmer: "Sugar Shack" topped Billboard's national sales chart for five weeks, becoming the Number One top-selling song of 1963. "Bottle of Wine" and other hits followed throughout the 1960s.

It was the Fireballs' Stan Lark who sparked the idea for Wednesday's event. He wanted a "Rock

Heroin, theft charges land local woman in jail

A Trinidad woman landed in jail on heroin-possession and theft charges on Tuesday, June 17, after a Walmart security camera observed her stealing several items from the store. County Sheriff's deputies arrested Tabatha Aragon, 20, at approximately 7 p.m. in the 800 block of North Linden Avenue, while she was a passenger in a white Chevrolet pickup truck.

Aragon was observed stuffing several items down the front of her pants by one of the store's video cameras approximately one hour earlier. She was observed getting into a white pickup truck. A Trinidad police officer identified Aragon from a picture printout taken from the video. The parking lot

was searched, but the white pickup wasn't found, and the search eventually ended with the traffic

stop on North Linden Avenue. Aragon's possessions were searched by City police, who had also arrived at the scene after the truck was stopped, and officers found three Nintendo Wii video games, a cell phone case and some makeup items worth more than \$50 but less than \$350, according to a police report. All of the items were among those allegedly stolen from the store. Police officers also found many small pieces of tinfoil with black scorch marks on them. When asked about the tinfoil Aragon told the officers, "Honey, I use those to smoke hash." Offi-

marijuana, well I am against marijuana," Bonato said. "I just want to tell the mayor and this Council one thing: I am part of this Council, and I do respect this Council, and in return all I want is the respect of this Council the way I respect them. In other words, the comment that was just made right now was in bad taste, and it

rock-like substance in Aragon's wallet, and she eventually admitted that the substance was black-tar heroin. Deputies also found short hollow tubes, bent paperclips and other items consistent with being drug paraphernalia.

Aragon advised police that all of the drugs, drug paraphernalia and stolen items were in her possession, not the driver's, and she was completely cooperative with police during the search, according to the report. The pickup's driver was searched and then released. Aragon was arrested and taken to Mt. San Rafael Hospital for a medical clearance. While there, she thanked a police officer for giving her a "reality check" and said she would kick her drug habit. She was booked

into the County jail without incident.

Aragon faces a felonv charge of heroin possession, a misdemeanor charge of theft and two petty-offense charges, one for possession of drug paraphernalia and one for possession of less than two ounces of mari-
