City sees increase in marijuana tax revenues

Trinidad's fledgling marijuana industry is continuing to grow, resulting in some increases in local sales tax revenue, as well as revenues from rebates on state marijuana tax revenues. Total marijuanarelated sales in the City at the end of June amounted to \$2,724,488, year-to-date, while the City's five-percent retail marijuana sales tax, and state marijuana sales tax rebate revenues were a combined total of \$166,750 at the end of the first six months of 2015. That's a combination of \$136,224 in City marijuana taxes, plus \$30,526 in state marijuana tax rebates. The state rebates are paid to the City on a one-month delay basis.

Marijuana sales, and the tax revenues generated from them, have been climbing steadily over the past few months. At the end of April 2015, monthly marijuana sales in the City were valued at \$473,732, an increase of approximately 14 percent over the previous month. Those sales generated combined City and State sales tax revenues of \$29.911 for the month.

At the end of May 2015, monthly marijuana sales in the City were valued at \$610,212, an increase of approximately 29 percent over the April sales figures. Those sales generated combined City and State tax revenues of \$37,584 for the month.

At the end of June 2015, monthly marijuana sales in the City were valued at \$714,275, an increase of approximately 17 percent over the May sales figures. Those sales generated combined City and State tax revenues of \$53,431 for the month.

City Finance Director Larry Lochard said part of the increase was to be expected because more retail marijuana businesses have opened in Trinidad since the beginning of 2015. Lochard said in a Tuesday interview in his office that the City had estimated marijuana tax revenues of \$100,000 for 2015, and that's the figure that's in this year' annual budget. He also said that the legalized marijuana picture around the United States was changing rapidly, and those changes could impact how much marijuana sales tax revenue Trinidad could expect, going into the future.

"I wasn't part of that budgeting process last year, so I don't know what went on," Lochard said. "I can tell you that we're starting the budgeting process right now, and we're not going to budget these kinds of numbers for next year.

The City wasn't sure how much marijuana tax revenue to estimate for 2016, he said, because of the rapidly changing legalized marijuana situation nationwide.

Glenn Miller Orchestra's dinner, dance fills Raton Convention Center

RATON - After October's triumphant Shuler Theater concert by the Glenn Miller Orchestra, Raton Arts & Humanities Council's director Brenda Ferri wasted no time: She booked them to return to play a summer benefit for the arts council. Saturday night's dinner/dance at Raton Convention Center, underwritten by the Darden Foundation, was a season highlight for the community with 168 people, mostly couples, com-

ing for prime rib and swing music. A \$50 ticket supported the arts council's programs while getting a complete prime rib dinner catered by Mr. C's and a full bar run by Raton Country Club. As dessert plates were cleared from tables, the band jumped right into swing classics from the 1930s and 40s. Dancers



wasted no time, immediately filling the floor and keeping it filled for three hours.

The Glenn Miller Band tours incessantly-they're playing four states this week as they continue westward from Raton—and the musicianship demonstrates that practice makes perfect. Although the convention center's lighting and acoustics couldn't match those of the Shuler, that didn't keep the band from swinging hard and the dancers from responding in kind. In combining fine dining, great music and dance, the arts council reminded all that the arts are multi-faceted.

Beetles, weather, combine to damage elms in SE Colorado

Elm trees in southeast Colorado are having a bad year. On the heels of years of drought, which already had reduced overall tree health, they are suffering from a one-two punch of a dramatic temperature decline last November - from the high seventies to well below zero in just a few days, damaging trees that had not yet gone dormant followed by more recent attacks



from elm leaf beetles. As a result of the weather extremes, many trees are declining or even dying,

and now the beetles are causing their leaves to brown out, adding to their damaged appearance. Donna Davis, district forester

for the Colorado State Forest Service La Junta District, says her office has received numerous calls in recent weeks from homeowners and others concerned about their elms. She says these trees and beetles have co-existed since the trees were introduced here, but elms that lost leaves and branches as a result of past weather events weakened them and made them susceptible to significant damage from the insects this year.

Siberian, American and English elms all are being impacted in counties including Crowley, Otero, Bent, Kiowa, Cheyenne, Prowers, Baca and Las Animas.

"Persistent drought and last fall's rapid temperature drop are

probably the biggest drivers of the current elm decline in southeast Colorado," said Davis. "But now the elm leaf beetle is having a much greater impact than usual,

Highway 160 between Trinidad, Springfield now open to through traffic

New bridge work finished, some delays still expected

LAS ANIMAS COUNTY The 56-year-old bridge located about seven miles west of Kim at Smith Canyon, is finished and Highway 160 is now open. Work will continue to improve the 18 mile segment of U.S. 160 between mile 405 and 423, east and west of Kim, CO. The remainder of the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) project consists of rotomilling, asphalt paving, full-depth patching at select locations, new guardrails, traffic delineators and striping is continuing and is scheduled for completion in November 2015.

Project hours are 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday through Friday. During paving operations, drivers can expect single lane closures, with alternating traffic through the work zone. Delays up to 15 minutes
