

TRINIDAD STATE BASEBALL

Trojans roll to second R9 Title in Lamar play

The Trinidad State baseball team finished third in the regular season race for the Empire Conference crown, but that did not stop the Trojans from claiming their second Region IX title in as many years this past weekend at the Region IX Tournament in Lamar. The Trojans won three games in three days to bring home the trophy. They will now prepare for the Western District Tournament in Henderson, Nevada later this week.

The regular season race was tight all spring, coming down to a fourway competition the final two weeks of the season. Lamar ended up first with a 26-10 record, followed by Otero at 24-12, Trinidad at 21-15 and Northeastern at 20-16. The top four teams qualify for the tournament so it ended up that Lamar would host Northeastern and Otero faced the Trojans.

The tournament got underway on Thursday with the hometown Lopes getting the better of NJC 5-1 in the opener. The Trojans then faced the Rattlers in the nightcap. TSJC jumped out to an early 3-0 lead on a home run by Alex Dominguez. Pitcher Alex Rogers kept Otero under wraps early and the Trojans increased the lead to 6-0. The rest of the

ASK-A-LAWYER DAY

Court's successful event returns Monday

The Third Judicial District (encompassing Huerfano and Las Animas counties) and their Ac-

cess to Justice Committee will host their sec-Ask-a-Lawond yer Day event, which is designed to provide residents with free 20-minute legal consultations with local attorneys regarding matters, civil in Trinidad on Monday, May 18.

The event will run from 3:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the Las Animas County Courthouse at 200 East First Street. Reservations are encouraged and can be made by calling (719) 680-7333. Walk-ins will be served on a first-come, firstserve basis.

The first Ask-a-Lawyer event

in February was hugely successful, according to Third Judicial Court Judge Leslie Gerbracht and District Problem Solving Court Coordinator C.J. Montoya. Filling the third floor of the Las Animas County Courthouse, 36

people-mostly local residents, but some drove from as far as Pueblo-attended the last event. Those people ranged in age from 20-60, represented a huge swath of varying backgrounds and said Judge Gerbracht—no one was turned away—during

the three-hour session.

"We just want to serve as many people as we can," said Judge Gerbracht.

Montoya said, "The majority of [the cases lawyers consulted on at the last event] were domestic relations cases involving custody,

divorce. That was about 60 percent of what we had. The rest were property, real estate cases, we had some money cases, small claims. civil stuff. A very few were [workman's] comp related."



Ask-A-Lawyer: Court's successful event returns Monday

Lawyers at the event are prepared to handle any legal questions, except for criminal cases.

We try to target indigent populations, that's the purpose of all the Access to Justice Committee's [work]: to increase access to the people that can't afford it," said Montoya discussing the purpose of the new judicial committee and their first, and so-far, verypopular event. 'We were able to accomplish that with the last event. We didn't turn people away that were qualified for legal services. So we were able to serve everybody, but the targeted population of people [that we try to help are those] that wouldn't be able to get legal services, because of their income.'

Due to the response from the last event the committee is adding a fourth lawyer to help handle the demand. Montoya said the enthusiastic response from local attorneys willing to provide pro-bono services has been overwhelming.

Lawyers at the event will include local lawyers Dixie Land and Les Downs and Erin Pickering (with Colorado Legal Services) and Pam Nelson. Other resources from the courts will also be available. Montoya said a big part of his job, and a big part of the Ask-A-Lawyer event, is making sure people representing themselves get the right forms and know how to fill them out. "Even if you have some experience with the law, if you've ever looked at some of these forms they might as well be written in Chinese," says Montoya. So, on Ask-A-Lawyer Day, district court staff will be available to print needed forms and help people fill them out.

New to the event, local attorney Les Downs said this is the first event like this that he has attended in his 27 years as an attorney. "I'm really excited about doing this," Downs said Monday at City Hall. "I think this is a wonderful thing that they're doing. It should be a lot of fun and I hope we get a good turnout."

Many people don't know exactly where they stand when it comes to legal issues, he said, and it is important for them to get accurate legal information, especially concerning whether or not they qualify for free legal representation and under what circumstances.

'They have the Public Defender's Office if they're accused of a crime, and if they qualify financially," he said. "They have Colorado Legal Services for people who need help in civil cases. If anyone wants to qualify for free legal aid from Colorado Legal Services, then they can't be the one who initiated a legal proceeding, so they can't be the ones who started things, and the other side has to be represented by a lawyer. Then and only then are they able to apply for a court-appointed attorney in something like a divorce case. So there are a lot of people who are not able to qualify for court-appointed counsel in domestic cases. It's almost impossible for them to get a lawyer in, say, landlord / tenant cases or things like that, so this

Said Judge Gerbracht, "As judges and lawyers and people who work with these things every day, we forget sometimes how scary, overwhelming and foreign it can be to deal with the court system and our processes. This event is meant to breakdown some of those barriers.'

Teen artist wins another Best of Show award

85 entries from youth living throughout northeastern New Mexico and southeastern Colorado.

This time her winning work was a charcoal drawing called "Still Life with Pears," chosen by a team of three judges over more than 200 other entries in ten media categories, including five other entries by Hunnicutt herself in three other media. In addition to the charcoal drawing, she entered one oil, one acrylic, and three pastels.

There were many other winners Thursday night, in each media and for each class, but if Hunnicutt had a first runner-up it had to be senior Kristina Jansen, whose "Bird's Nest" won not only the Senior Award for best work by a senior, but also the audience Popular Award, determined afterward by ballots voted by each person who saw the show on opening night.

RHS teacher and club sponsor Kathy Vertovec is only the second art teacher in the show's 45year history. Founded by Marv Newton, still one of the region's most prominent artists, he continued teaching at the school through 26 years of the show. One of his students was Kathy Vertovec, who followed Newton to teach art at RHS for 19 years. As Vertovec prepares to retire, this was her final year as teacher and sponsor.

She chose this year to recognize the important role played by the school district's elementary art teachers, selecting three of them to judge this year's show. Melissa Medina and Phyllis Trujillo were joined in the judging by former middleschool art teacher Carol Crary.

Prizes included both award ribbons and envelopes containing cash, provided by a long list of sponsors that included The Whited Foundation, International Bank, Wells Fargo Bank, Rocky Mountain Physical Therapy, Family Practice Associates, Mesa Vista Veterinary Hospital, Arthur Insurance Agency, Raton Builders Supply, BTU

Block and Concrete, Raton Kiwanis Club, and a long list of individuals.

"The community has always supported this program, and that's what's made it so successful," Vertovec says. Despite its small size,

Raton has earned a reputation as an arts community with a plethora of arts organizations and venues. Often overlooked is the role that's been played by its school programs in the arts. including the visual arts, music, and drama. Along with former Raton teachers Marv Newton and Carol Craryboth still prominent working artists—many of their former students remain active in the lo-

cal arts scene. Hunnicutt July credits her own sister.

Autumn Hunnicutt, as an inspiration. Autumn won "Best of Show" at Youth in Art 2011 when she was an RHS sophomore. Both sisters entered multiple pieces every year at RHS. Their immersion in the school's arts program over several years produced show-stopping talents in both of them.

"I made four of my entries this year in my art classes," said July. "Our art program has supported me and made me grow. At this point my
