Changes afoot for Library's History Room

The History Room at the Carnegie Public Library in Trinidad is an important community asset, offering genealogists, historians and others the chance to research family histories or conduct searches of the places, people and events of days gone by. In order to protect its valuable collections, many of which are very old and in fragile condition, the library's staff and its Advisory Board have decided to implement some new policies related to the public use of the History Room and its collections, effective August 1, 2015.

A recently published library document outlines the long-term plan for the preservation and organization of the History Room and the materials it contains. While the library tries to take into account the viewpoints of all the History Room's patrons, the Library Director, with the assistance of its Advisory Board, will make all decisions regarding management, policy and other issues. The regulations are intended to serve the best interests of the History Room, library staff, current patrons and future generations, with a comprehensive plan covering the broad spectrum of resources in the History Room, which, in the future, might have to be temporarily closed to the public to implement the new changes.

Library Director Mallory Pillard said she had wanted to make a few changes in the History Room's operations since she first took on the job in Trinidad a few years ago.

"I've had a lot of discussions with our Library Advisory Board, and they're also kind of supportive of reorganizing the History Room, because there's file boxes back there and sometimes you don't know where

Local golfer qualifies for British Senior Amateur Championship

It is not very often that a local small town golfer gets the opportunity to play in a major championship. After August 7, Tom Shultz

will have done it twice. The accomplished senior golfer whose claim to fame was qualifying for the 2005 U.S. Senior Open, recently qualified ior the Senior Amateur British Open Championship August 5-7 at Northern Ireland's Royal County Down in

Newcastle, United Kingdom.

Shultz qualified for the tournament by shooting a 155 over two cold and wet days at Wade Hampton Golf Course in Cashiers, North Carolina. The score was good enough for him to get into a 13-man

playoff with six spots available and he punched his ticket to Northern Ireland on the second hole.

"It was rainy and cold the first day and we got rained out," said Shultz. "We had come back, finish from where we left off, and then play another 18 holes. I got into a

playoff with 13 other guys with six or seven spots left and I got in on the second hole. Then I got paired up against the defending champion in the match play and lost in tne iirst match. It was still a good experience though."

More than 200 golfers from all over the world applied for the

chance to play at Wade Hampton golf course, but only 144 were chosen. Shultz said he got in on an exemption he didn't even know he had. All he had to do to punch his

to find things," Pillard said. "Things that are supposed to be in one spot aren't there, and maybe they're somewhere else. It's really hard for people who are just passing through. For just ease of use and access, it could be more user friendly."

Most items in the History Room are non-circulating due to their historic importance and value, regardless of sticker demarcation, although some books can be checked out. In order to check out a book from the History Room, patrons must be residents of Trinidad and have had their library card for a period of six months in good standing. History Room books check out for two weeks, and will be assessed regular fines for days late. Pictures, files, certain binders and other documents may not be checked

The History Room is available on an appointment only basis, and appointments must be made two days in advance by calling the library at: 719-846-6841. Patrons are limited to three appointments per month and three per week. The maximum capacity of the History Room is five people, and no more than two research groups totaling five people may be in the room during one appointment period. Allotted appointment periods are limited to two hours. Patrons must check in at the front desk before entering the History Room, and must place their bags and purses in the locker outside the room. Locks and keys may be provided. No item will leave the History Room without the prior consent of the Library Director or staff. Two or more "noshow" appointments may result in suspension of the use of the history room.


Cotton gloves may be needed to handle certain items, in some cases, and will be provided by library staff. Patrons should not handle anything without the prior consent of library staff and the use of gloves. The historical collection is subject to weeding like the rest of the library's collection and will only contain items of local historical or genealogical importance. That includes items regarding the City of Trinidad or Las Animas County. No more than 10 percent of the collection will be composed of materials regarding surrounding counties, cities, states or miscellaneous items, although items will be kept based on their historic importance. Patrons should note that not everything that is old is of historic importance.

The History Room seeks to be as user friendly as possible for ease of research and access to materials. As such, it is the duty of library staff to ensure that the collection is current, relevant,

useful and circulating. Some historical artifacts are delicate, and require resources that the Carnegie Public Library does not currently have access to. To preserve the item for future generations, it may be pertinent to house the item elsewhere. Moving items from the History Room to be better stored is the decision of the Library Director, with the help of the Advisory

will be stored on the history room computer. The history room printer/copier is also for historical research only. Personal print outs and documents can be obtained from the printer/computers near the front circulation desk. Print outs and copies are 25 cents each for black and white, 50 cents each for color. Storing personal items on the History Room computer and/or neglecting to pay for copies may result in suspension of History Room privileges. If a patron is unable to make an appointment for their own research, or chooses not to, a written request may be submitted for a staff person to complete the research

research is \$7.50 per hour, plus a fee for copies and postage if applicable. Cash or check is accepted and can be mailed to the library, at 201 N. Animas St., Trinidad, CO, 81082.

Donations to the History Room are accepted based on genealogical or historical relevance (as outlined above). Donations, once accepted, are the property of the library and may be subject to weeding, change of location, or modification, according to the new History Room policies.

Pillard said she thought History Room users would adjust to the changes once they'd gotten used to them.

'Regardless of some of the contention there's been in the past about the History Room, I think it's time to leave those feelings in the past," she said. "To me, if we continue the way we're doings things now, some of those documents are not going to be there for future generations, which to me is the whole point. You want to preserve those things as long as possible. Anyone who's used the History Room knows that we've lost certain things. They've been lost or stolen or things have been damaged beyond repair. We're just trying to take some steps to eliminate those issues. I think people will get used to these new policies, once they have the chance to become familiar with them."

"Alice in Wonderland." Cassie Thompson choreographed this summer's dance numbers.

The students have been working—it looks a lot like play—from 10 to 4 daily for three weeks, with a daily lunch break in Ripley Park. "The first week we did workshops and exercises,' McCabe says, "where the kids got used to what we'd be doing in rehearsals. Nora and I gauged their abilities and experience, so it was the beginning of casting. The kids learned to work with text and move on stage. They learned a shared theater vocabulary so they could work well as a unit."

At the start of the second week, each student auditioned for parts in the play. "It's a kind of job interview," McCabe says. "The whole three-week camp is intended to help the kids with interviews, public speaking, group projects, confidence, and school success in general.'

Leahy adjusted her script-writing approach

this year. "Last year, I wrote our 'Alice in Wonderland' before I met the kids. This year, I mapped out a loose outline of the scenes in advance, but I waited to write the specific dialog to suit the kids that we cast in the play.

"I tried to use Kipling's own words as much as possible," Leahy says. "The Mowgli stories are dispersed throughout the book so I gathered

them to give him a chronological narrative." She and McCabe have used two experienced help wrangle all the young students throughout the program and the stage production. "We have 18 kids in the play," Leahy says. "Seventy percent were with us in 'Alice in Wonderland' last year. The kids are focused and want to do well, so it's been a fun environment."
