It's always good news when City departments make some progress, and especially when that progress benefits the citizens of Trinidad. During Tuesday's City Council meeting it was announced that the fire department was getting a good, used fire truck at a rock bottom price, and that the Carnegie Public Library had gotten the needed funding to upgrade its multi-purpose room.

Library Director Mallory Pillard said she'd managed to secure a \$10,000 grant from the Trinidad Carnegie Library Foundation, which, along with \$5,000 from the City, will enable the library to remodel its multi-purpose room on the library's lower level.

"I'm very excited because one of my goals when I came here was to broaden the impact of the library in the community," Pillard said. "I think having this room will allow us to do that and expand our services. We've really felt the crunch for space for our summer reading program, but now that we're able to offer programs for teens, adults and children year around, this

RATON – After a packed house of comedy fans laughed until it statements in the lobby highlighted the success of the night's Latin Comedy Jam. Shuler Theater impresario Bill Fegan revealed that the night of stand-up comedy was apparently the first in the Shuler's history; at least, Fegan's never seen one and he's been there almost non-stop since 1963. gotten a phone call the week before from John Garcia, a former Trinidad firefighter who's now a fireman in Arvada.

'He called and told me Arvada was getting rid of a 1993 Flint fire truck," Howard said. "As the Council knows, our fire fleet is somewhat aged. This truck has a 1,500-gallon pump, which our current ladder truck does not. It's got a 50-foot ladder, while our current one is 65-feet. This one, during major fires, will free up another engine to actually fight fires. This will increase our pumping capacity in a city fire by 30 percent. It comes with 1,000-feet of five inch hose, and five inch hose costs about \$650 per hundred-foot. There's another \$1,500-feet of hose, \$500 worth of generators, a five-inch hydrant valve and \$1,000 worth of additional equipment. Overall we're getting \$12,000 to \$15,000 worth of additional equipment, and we worked out a deal with the City of Arvada to get all this for \$5,000."

Howard said he'd checked online and found that the value of a similar truck and equipment was between \$85,000 and \$175,000. Arvada also gave away 100 sets of used bumper gear, which Howard said would be distributed to area fire departments.
