Farmers thrash Swink in homecoming

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Following that Lion kickoff return early in the game, the Hoehne defense was near impeccable. Kyle Kreutzer led the charge with seven tackles, a sack, and a fumble recovery. Jared Smith and Anthony Payne combined for ten tackles, a fumble recovery, and a tackle for a loss. Standout defensive back Jacob Yates chipped in with four tackles and another sack. Everybody got involved. The defenders in red were having some kind of homecoming fun.

"They played hard, but we worked on that all week," echoed Coach Gabe Dasko. "Now we have next week. We play Kiowa and they're a good team. But tonight was good. Our line played well throughout. They stayed with them on their blocks. We made some mistakes, missing two fourth downs and turning the ball over, but they overcame that. I was impressed with our young kids. They played with a lot of hustle."

Offensively, the Farmers were unstoppable. Yates rushed for 121 yards, Trystan Moltre contributed 52, and Jesse Solano and Robins added 34 and 33 yards respectively. Senior Jacob Elsberry was spectacu-

lar with 145 yards on kickoff returns. Quarterback Tyson Montoya was successful on five of nine passes for 61 more.

"Our kids physically popped them tonight," said assistant coach Mike Dasko. "If we continue to play with that kind of intensity, we'll be alright. They blocked really well up front and the backers played hard. Our line opened some big holes to run through. They definitely played well and with a lot of physicality. Effort goes a long way in this game."

The Farmers (3-0, 4-2), firing on all eight cylinders against the Lions, will sojourn to battle a formidable Kiowa team for yet another crucial Southern League game on Friday. Kickoff is slated for 7:00 p.m.
