

## "What's your favorite season?"



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and threw the ball well. We were alternating Thomas (Bowman) and Ethan (Duran) at quarterback, and they both threw for almost 100 yards. Bowman had three aerial touchdowns. And our players had some memories of what they did to us last year. They played with a little bit of a revenge factor on their minds."

The Miners, with 34 unanswered points in the first period, rushed for 235 yards on 27 carries and collected 196 through the air on eight of ten passing. Bowman and Duran passed for 91 and 90 yards respectively. Dylan Armijo was one for one for 15. Bowman led in rushing with 96 yards, Duran tallied 65, and Antonio Rivera 74. Izzv Manzanares led the receivers with three catches for 52 vards. Bowman one for 48. Duran one for 31 and a TD, Brandon Aragon one for 27 and a TD, JJ Miera one for 23 and a TD, and Patrick Sandoval one for 15 yards. Duran rushed for five touchdowns and hauled in a Bowman pass for six TD's on the night. Aragon and Miera also added touchdown receptions from Bowman.

We played some games that we should have won, but our kids showed up no matter whom they played," added assistant coach Gary Vezzani. "Last Friday they really played well. Quentin Bathje recorded two interceptions, Isaiah Vigil one, Rivera recovered two fumbles, and Darian Lujan and Aragon each recovered a fumble. And all without the services of stalwart player Vance Ferraro who was out for a second week with an injury.

"We played really well on defense," Begano concluded. "We had three turnovers resulting in 20 points in the first five minutes. Overall, everyone played well. Our first goal now is to win Friday. Manitou is playing very well. They like to spread you out and throw and run which they do well. They have a big190 pound running back, but other than that, they're kind of like us. 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Broncos dodge major injuries to Ray, Sanders

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. (AP) — Coach Gary Kubiak says the Broncos dodged major injuries to first-round draft pick Shane Ray and star wide receiver Emmanuel Sanders in their 26-23 overtime win at Cleveland.

Ray has a sprained right MCL and is expected to miss a few weeks. Sanders has a bruised left shoulder but should be back for the showdown against Green Bay on Nov. 1 following both club's bye week, Kubiak said Monday.

Ray was injured when teammate Derek Wolfe shoved Browns right tackle Mitchell Schwartz into the back of his legs. Sanders was injured trying to make a diving catch at the end of regulation.

Also, inside linebacker Corev Nelson (ankle, knee) is day to day, Kubiak said.
