





quarter with a one-yard run and the Farmers sent the Bobcats home with their eighth loss of the season.

The win moves the Farmers' record to 7-2 on the season, their two losses coming to state qualifiers Springfield and Dove Creek. Dasko knows it's going to take his team's best effort to push deep into the playoffs and said that the team has been on a mission since the four-point loss to Dove Creek less than a month ago. While it may have taken his boys a little longer to buy into his system than usual, when they did, the results spoke for themselves.

"Early on in the season, I really don't think they bought what I sold them about playing hard, but now they bought into it because they saw our successes. After the Dove Creek game, we had a coming to Jesus party and we told the guys, 'You need to learn to play hard.' We practiced it, maybe some of it was my fault, maybe some of it was their fault, but there is always one thing you can control in football and that's effort. And I don't think we came to play

against Springfield and I don't think we gave a great effort against Dove Creek, and it showed because we lost the game. We can't afford that in the playoffs."

The Farmers will host Merino on Saturday afternoon at Jasper Butero Field. The 6-3 Rams come into the contest as the No. 4 seed in the Plains League that also houses perennial powerhouses Dayspring Christian, Sedwick County and Caliche. Dasko recognized the tough contest ahead of them, but said that as long as his team comes out and plays Hoehne Football, they should be ok.

"We have to go out there and play tough Hoehne Farmer football from beginning to end. It's like I told our kids, every play matters in the playoffs. Every turnover, every penalty. Just because you are the No. 1 seed doesn't mean you are going to win it. Teams aren't going to lay down for us, they aren't going to lie down and quit just because we are Hoehne," he said.

The Aguilar Lady Wildcats hosted the Mountain Valley Indians Monday, Oct. 26 in a 1-A District-6 pigtail matchup.
