## Construction digs up local phone trouble

Construction on Commercial St. in downtown Trinidad is being blamed for starting over a weeklong internet and landline phone outage for CenturyLink customers in the city.

"The contractor did catch the phone line," said Mike Valentine, Director of Public Works and Utilities in Trinidad. Purgatoire Valley Construction, the contractor for the city, "nicked the cable" when they "kind of caught it and pulled it," Valentine explained during an interview Saturday.

This incident occurred approximately two weeks ago and was actually repaired quickly by CenturyLink, the server for the damaged cable. The problems that residents then later experienced could stem from a different cause, according to a network technician

cial St., the former Bueno's Restaurant.

for the company. He said the cable was actually hit in two places by Purgatoire Valley Construction, and CenturyLink failed to locate and fix the second break point. This neglect allowed moisture from recent thunderstorms to ruin the unprotected cables, leaving many citizens without phone service. Yet, between Century Link, the City of Trinidad and their contractor, several fingers are being pointed for who is to blame.

Trinidad City Manager Gabe Engeland said in a short interview on Saturday that the problem was "separate from us," regarding the city government's role in the is-

Meanwhile, Purgatoire Valley Construction confronted Century-Link about the problem when they initially dug up the cable, reported both Valentine and the company technician. CenturyLink did the

## Raton writer pauses to offer summer creativity retreats

RATON - Sharon Niederman's 22nd book has just been published but all she wants to talk about is a pair of workshop retreats she's presenting at The Mandala Center this month and next. She relaxing on the high front porch of the 109-year-old westside home she shares with her husband, Chuck Henry, right under the iconic Raton sign.

"I try to design a workshop that would be fun for me to go to," she says. First up is a gentle day of nature, creativity and lunch. "It's a one-day adult summer camp,' Niederman says.

"Finding Your Path on the Mountain,' Saturday, July 25 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., will take advantage of The Mandala Center's

extensive trail system for participants to share morning walks on the shoulder of Sierra Grande, an 8000-foot volcano that dwarfs its neighboring Capulin Volcano, just west of Des Moines and 35 miles

east of Raton. "We'll spend the morning walking and observing, maybe taking notes in journals, and enjoying the peace and beauty of the mountain," Niederman says. Her intention is priming the pumps of creativity, but that comes after lunch. The Mandala Center is renowned for its professional kitchen and memorable meals. Lunch will be accompanied by readings from beloved nature writers Annie Dillard, Gretel Ehrlich, Terry Tempest Williams and Henry David Thoreau.

# New statewide program to launch to reduce energy use in agricultural industry

DENVER - July 13, 2015 - The Colorado Energy Office, in partnership with the Colorado Department of Agriculture, has a new statewide dairy and irrigation energy efficiency program that builds on the success of its 2014 pilot program to reduce energy use in Colorado's agricultural sector.

The new statewide program will provide energy services

The new statewide program will provide energy services to a minimum of 80 agricultural producers annually for three years. Program participants will receive a free energy audit, renewable energy assessment, technical support and access to financial resources that will help reduce the upfront cost of energy efficiency improvements.

"Dairies and irrigators that participate in the statewide program can benefit from reduced energy use and utility costs, resulting in a more competitive, sustainable business operation," said Jeffrey Ackermann, director of the Colorado Energy Office

Colorado's agricultural industry faces direct energy expenses of more than \$400 million annually that account for 7 percent of the industry's overall expenses.

In the spring of 2014, the Colorado Energy Office launched the Colorado Dairy and Irrigation Efficiency Pilot program to address industry expenses. The program was designed to decrease the barriers that prevent agricultural producers from investing in energy efficiency by bringing existing resources and partners together, leveraging new funding and implementing a turnkey approach.

The pilot program conducted energy audits for 12 farms, and worked with 8 dairies to install measures that will save over 260,000 kWh of electricity, 10,000 ccf of natural gas, and 9,500 gallons of propane annually, the equivalent of more than \$47,000 in annual cost savings. With approximately \$168,000 in incentives, producers will be able to see a return on their investments in less than four years, with many measures paying for themselves in energy savings in less than two years.

lish from George Washington University, a master's degree in journalism from the University of Colorado and studied photography at prestigious schools in New York City and Washington, D.C. She later studied writing with Tony Hillerman and Rudolfo Anaya at the University of New Mexico.

Niederman will bring all of her training and experience to an intensive four-day writing workshop at The Mandala Center Wednesday, August 26 through Saturday, August 30. "Writing Your Way Home: A Guided Four-Day Writing Retreat" will immerse participants in their own projects, whether an unfinished manuscript, a poetry collection or memoir—whatever pages or ideas may have been gathering dust.

The Mandala Center's flier says the workshop "will allow your project the space and understanding it needs to blos-


som. While you will have ample solitary work time, you will also benefit from community support. Information on printing, publishing, agents, genres, self-publishing, establishing a work space and work schedule, and more to lead to your next step will be provided by teacher Sharon Niederman."

The Mandala Center's location is characterized by panoramic views, nature, silence and stillness, all perfect for inspiring new work and providing the time to accomplish it.

The four-day August writers' retreat costs \$585 with private room or \$465 with shared room, and includes workshop fees and all meals.

"I've taught this workshop at The Mandala Center a couple times before," Niederman says. "It's a wonderful way to kick start your manuscript."

Not that she needs a kickstart herself. Hard at work on her second novel, set in the Amazon and based on her travels there eight years ago, Niederman is also busy freelancing features for a variety of magazines and newspapers. It's a marvel that she finds time to relax on the front porch.
