Fire Chief Tim Howard said a fire truck typically has a working lifespan of 10 years with five years of frontline service and five years in reserve, but he said Trinidad's



Bent's Old Fort National Historic Site will host a day-long Frontier Skills Day Saturday, March 19, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Adult participants will get a taste of the fur-trade frontier life of the 1830s and 1840s when Bent's Fort marked the U.S. boundary with Mexico. Pre-registration is required.

Bent's Fort Frontier Skills Day offers unique opportunity Sat.

LA JUNTA – Bent's Fort National Historic Site presents its daylong Frontier Skills Day Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Participants age 18 and older will gain a hands-on living history experience. Late registration is available this week for limited openings.

When registering for the \$20 program, each participant will give first and second choices for roles that include trader, laborer, domestic, carpenter, blacksmith and hunter-trapper. Registration includes a mid-day period lunch for all.

Participants will experience the fur-trade frontier life of the 1830s and 1840s as Bent's Fort residents and visitors experienced it when the fort's location along the Arkansas River marked the United States border with Mexico. Bent's Fort was an important stop

along the Santa Fe Trail. Saturday's program will emphasize the historic values of Bent's Fort as well as the cultural relationships and the types of work performed in frontier Western America.

National Park Service em ees and volunteers will lead small groups that each spend the day specializing is one aspect of fort skills. One group will learn the work of traders including Indian sign language, peace treaties, fort supervision and operations man-

A laborer group will learn adobe work, livestock use and care, Hispanic frontier cooking and fort life. A domestic group will learn frontier cooking, garment making, candle making, food preservation and other domestic chores of the frontier fort.

A hunter-trapper group will learn camp setup, horse packing. animal tracking and trapping and

One dead after robbery, shooting in Colo. City

A man attempting to steal a car and flee was shot and killed by Colorado State Patrol Thursday at a gas station in Colorado City.

According to information released by the Colorado Bureau of Investigation, two Colorado State Patrol officers pulled over a car with a man and a woman inside it at around 8:30 p.m., near a gas station off exit 74 on Interstate 25. During the stop, CBI said, the man got out of his vehicle and attempted to flee. He then allegedly stole a car and sped toward the troopers who shot and killed him.

The man's identity has not been released. The two troopers involved, now on routine paid administrative leave, were uninjured in the incident, according to several media outlets. CBI as of late Friday had not released circumstances surrounding the traffic stop.

Man arrested for selling fraudulent driver licenses

On February 29, 2016, Michael David Hopkins, age 50, of Westminster was arrested on charges of forgery, impersonating a public servant, gathering identity information by deception and criminal possession of a forged instrument.

Hopkins has allegedly been soliciting individuals who were unable to lawfully obtain a driver license due to being under restraint, lack of qualifications or in-

ability to demonstrate lawful presence in the U.S. for the past two years. Hopkins would allegedly impersonate a DMV employee while meeting with individuals and provide them with counterfeit temporary driver licenses in exchange for

The Colorado DMV investigations unit is urging any individuals who may have been contacted by or used the services of this individual to contact the DMV hotline at 1-855-778-2368.

This case is being investigated by the Colorado Bureau of Investigation (CBI); Colorado Department of Revenue, Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV), Motor Vehicle Investigations Unit and Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE) Homeland Security Investigations (HSI). Colorado Department of Revenue re-


cords show that Hopkins has never been employed with the Colorado DMV.



31-year-old Rocky Ford man when Maes reportedly fired multiple rounds from a handgun, striking the victim. The victim sustained non-life-threatening injuries and is expected to make a full recovery.

A second suspect, Brittany Barron, 26, was also taken into custody and faces charges of attempted first-degree murder and domestic violence. She is being held at the Otero County Jail without bond. Her first appearance is slated for the morning of March 11, 2016. Maes's warrant is for attempted first-degree murder and first-degree assault. Maes has known ties to the Rocky

Ford and La Junta communities. Maes should be considered armed and dangerous.
