Visiting judge denies public defender's motion to dismiss case

A visiting judge has issued an order denying public defender Patrick McCarville's motion to dismiss the lawsuit brought against him by a prison inmate alleging fraud.

Judge Claude Appel disquali-

fied himself from the case after inmate Justin Rueb filed with the local court a letter blasting Appel for various conflicts of interest that Rueb claims should have disqualified Appel before he dismissed the case originally. This brought in visiting judge Charles R. Greenacre, who recently denied McCarville's motion to dismiss the case.

The case stems back to January 7, 2008, where McCarville represented Justin Rueb, then 33, in one criminal case out of two, the second of which Rueb intended to represent himself. Rueb underwent a sanity evaluation at the time and was found competent to stand trial; as a result, the cases were set for trial several months later on July 8 of the same year.

One week before the trials, McCarville was appointed to represent Rueb in both cases rather than just one, and he moved for a continuance in order to have more time to prepare a defense. At that point, Rueb asked McCarville to confirm whether or not the July 8 trial date fell within the six-month speedy trial deadline, to which McCarville told Rueb that it

THE GUITAR MAN

Local resident continues 50-year-old hobby — keeps others in mind

Though many hobbies are for the benefit of self, one local resident's way of staying busy benefits others just as well. Retired professor John Wood has been building, repairing, and refurbishing guitars for 50 years, and he hasn't kept many of them.

"I find people that need them," Wood explains, "It's hard to get into the music business anymore... but if you follow through on bass or guitar, who knows where it'll take you?"

Wood spends quite a bit of time on guitars of all makes and builds, including Gibson, Fender, Ibanez, and Harmony guitars among others, even having worked on a models from as early as the 1940s. He works with bodies from different companies, fretless necks, electrics, acoustics, and has even fixed up fiddles and violins. Why? "It keeps my mind occupied and keep going," he answers.

Second Chance Guitar Ltd. — the name of Wood's project — isn't even close to the only thing Wood has done within his lifetime. In fact, he has two doctorates from UCLA and Stanford in mathematics and chemistry, taught coding and vacuum technology
